Ullman Receives Award

Representative Al Ullman, Chairman of the House Committee on Ways and Means, was the recipient of the 26th annual achievement award. Ullman gave his address to "The Society" and its guests at its annual dinner on the 9th of June, at the N.Y.C. Club when the presentation was made.

Congressman Ullman has been a member of the Ways and Means Committee since January 1975. As Chairman, he alternates with Senator Long, Chairman of the Senate Committee on Finance, as Chairman of the Joint Committee on Internal Revenue Taxation.

As acting Chairman of the

Ways and Means Committee during much of 1973 and 1974, he directed development of the Trade Reform Act of 1974 and ERISA. As Chairman of the Committee in 1975, he was the principal author of the Tax Reduction Act of 1975, which produced the largest single tax cut in the nation's history. Congressman Ullman also led efforts that resulted in the enactment of the Tax Reform Act of 1976, the most far-reaching piece of tax legislation in years. Most recently, Congressman Ullman played a leading role in the passage of the Tax Reduction Act of 1977, now awaiting the signature of President Carter.

CONTEST RULES

1. All contests will be in drum order.

2. Registration for contestants will be open until 7:00 p.m. Saturday 25th (FINAL).

3. Contestants have to dance nightly to qualify.

4. Full regalia, according to tribal custom.

5. Loss of any regalia will disqualify dancer during competition. Number is part of regalia.

6. No tennis shoes, dark glasses or chewing gum.

7. All contestants must be in Grand Entry at 1:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. daily or will be disqualified.

8. All contestants must be at least 1/4 degree of an Indian Tribe.

9. Five men and women semi-finalists picked nightly.

10. Only registered drummers will be paid. Deadline 5 p.m. June 25.

11. All judges decisions are final.
