Students Land Jobs For Summer

The amount of activity in the CETA office has visibly increased these past few weeks as Benson Heath and his staff have been hectically matching up young people with jobs in connection with the Summer Work Program.

This year's program which will run from June 20 through August 12th is made up of four components, three of them tribally funded. The classifications are: 1) Student Trainee Program, for High School graduates and college students; 2) Boys and Girls Work Program, for those 14 to 18 years old; 3) Tree Thinning, generally for 16 to 18 year olds; and 4) the CETA program which is federally funded and for those from 14 to 18.

Summer positions have been filled in 24 departments and areas in addition to numerous jobs at Kah-Nee-Ta.

Approximately 103 students had signed up at press-time and were already on the job.

There are still a few positions available yet, according to Benson Heath. He advises anyone interested in working through the Summer Work Program to check with his office at the new administration building or call ext. 267 for information.

According to Heath, the present program evolved from summer camps conducted years ago — Camp Shitike for the boys and Camp Wapsinee for the girls. The kids had to camp out during the week where they did mostly conservation-type work, cultural activities and crafts work. Most would go home for the weekends, then return the next Monday to the camp.

Since then, the program has grown in scope, and tribal offices as well as the youth are benefiting from the yearly work program.
