

Congressman Al Ullman

WASHINGTON — Congressman Al Ullman today announced that he expects significant improvements to be made soon in the Federal Emergency Livestock Feed Assistance program.

Ullman said he has been assured by Congressman Tom Foley (D-Wash.), Chairman of House Agriculture Committee, that he will actively support transfer of the program from the Federal Disaster Assistance Administration in the Department of Housing and Urban Development to the Department of Agriculture. An agriculture bill, previously accepted by the Senate, includes a provision that would establish such a program and a House Agriculture subcommittee has reported a similar bill. In the weeks ahead Foley will head the House delegation that will meet with conferees of the Senate to resolve differences in the agriculture legislation adopted in each chamber.

Ullman said the emergency program has been of scant assistance to Oregon farmers and ranchers since 19 counties in the state became eligible for emergency assistance during the past three months.

"Agency regulations have seriously reduced the effectiveness of the program," Ullman said. "Arbitrary cut-off dates, coupled with inadequate, last minute extensions have made it almost impossible for livestock owners to make intelligent decisions on herd management."

Ullman said some of these problems could be solved by assigning principle responsibility for the livestock feeding assistance program to the Department of Agriculture instead of the Federal Disaster Assistance Administration in the Department of Housing and Urban Development. "Agriculture is the department of government where the unique problems of farmers and ranchers are clearly understood," said Ullman.

"If nothing else, I am confident that the Department of Agriculture's keen understanding of livestock planning problems will result in regulations which greatly improve the delivery of these vitally needed benefits," Ullman said.

Referendum Date Set For Aug. 9 Simnasho - Schoolie Water

The Tribal Council has called for a referendum vote on August 9 to determine if the Tribes want to spend \$360,000 for a Simnasho - Schoolie Flat domestic water system.

EDA (Economic Development Administration) will make available matching funds but wants to make sure the Confederated Tribes are willing to put up their 50 percent before obligating any money for the project.

The EDA money which will be made available is only for drought-affected water systems. EDA okayed the money on the basis of the existing need for domestic water at Simnasho-Schoolie at this time.

The project would include installing two 150,000 gallon reservoirs and piping water up from Beaver Creek. Both Simnasho and Schoolie Flat would be tied into the system and be served by the same source.

The new system, if ap-

proved by the voters, will be able to supply enough water to serve well over a hundred homes. The total cost of the project is estimated to run \$720,000.

The election will be at the teen center from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. August 9.

Below is a sample ballot so voters can study what the referendum calls for.

Sample Ballot

Resolution No. 4987

WHEREAS, the Tribal Council of the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation of Oregon is concerned with the effects of the Drought upon the Schoolie-Simnasho Water System; and

WHEREAS, the Economic Development Administration is providing fifty-percent (50%) Grant funds to remedy Drought affected domestic water system problems; and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that the cost of developing the Beaver Creek-Simnasho-Schoolie Water System is \$720,000; and

WHEREAS, the Tribal Council proposes the development of the Beaver Creek source, including intake structure, filtration plant, pumps, water main and reservoirs, in order to solve the Schoolie-Simnasho water problem;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Tribal Council of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, pursuant to Article V, Section 1 (t) as amended of the Constitution, that the 1977 Budget is hereby amended by the amount of \$360,000 for the purpose of the above project; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, pursuant to Article VI of the Constitution that August 9, 1977 is hereby designated as Election Day for the voters of the Confederated Tribes to vote on the following question:

"Shall the Tribal Council appropriate \$360,000 for the purpose of developing the Beaver Creek-Simnasho-Schoolie Water System"

CERTIFICATION

The undersigned, as Secretary-Treasurer of the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation of Oregon, hereby certifies that the Tribal Council is composed of 11 members, of whom 8 constituting a quorum were present at a meeting thereof, duly and regularly called, noticed, convened and held this 7th day of July, 1977; that the foregoing resolution was adopted by the affirmative vote of 7 members; the Chairman not voting; and that the said Resolution has not been rescinded or amended in any way.
