

Warm Springs Beats Lummi Twice in First Football Action

After only two weeks of practice the Warm Springs 9-12 year olds took two games from Lummi when they visited September 24-25.

Even though the Lummi team had been practicing five weeks and has a twenty year tradition behind them, Warm Springs coach Campy Smith said they "looked inexperienced."

"We were a little lacking in fundamentals," said Campy of his three year old team, "but we were more solid than the other team. Our experience pulled us through and we were a little bit better in blocking."

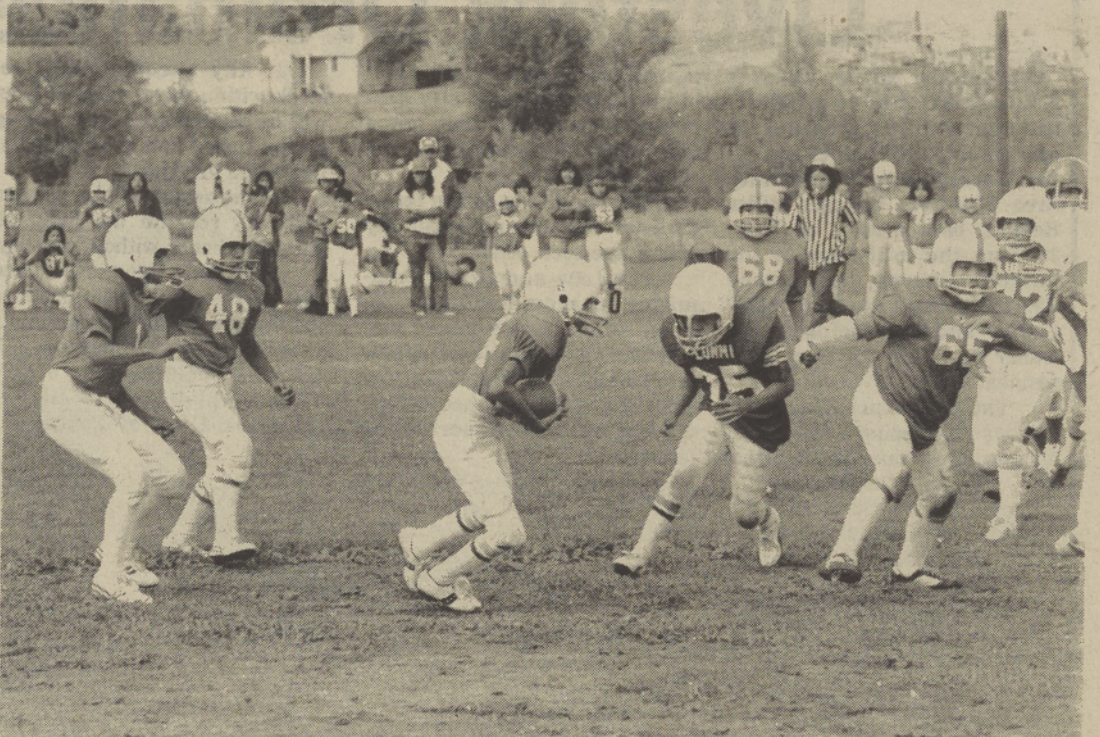
The first game on Saturday was won 8-0 with a fluke touchdown made in the third quarter when the Lummi squad was not

completely involved in play. The conversion points were made easily, said Campy.

On Sunday the game was won 14-0 with two impressive plays by Darrin Tewee. In the third quarter Warm Springs hit Lummi with a reverse and Darrin ran 65 yards for a touchdown.

In the last quarter Darrin made an end sweep and ran 40 yards with a couple of good blocks for the second touchdown.

It's back to Lummi for both the peewees and the older team this weekend October 1-2. Lummi couldn't bring their little guys last weekend so the young Warm Springs team was idle.

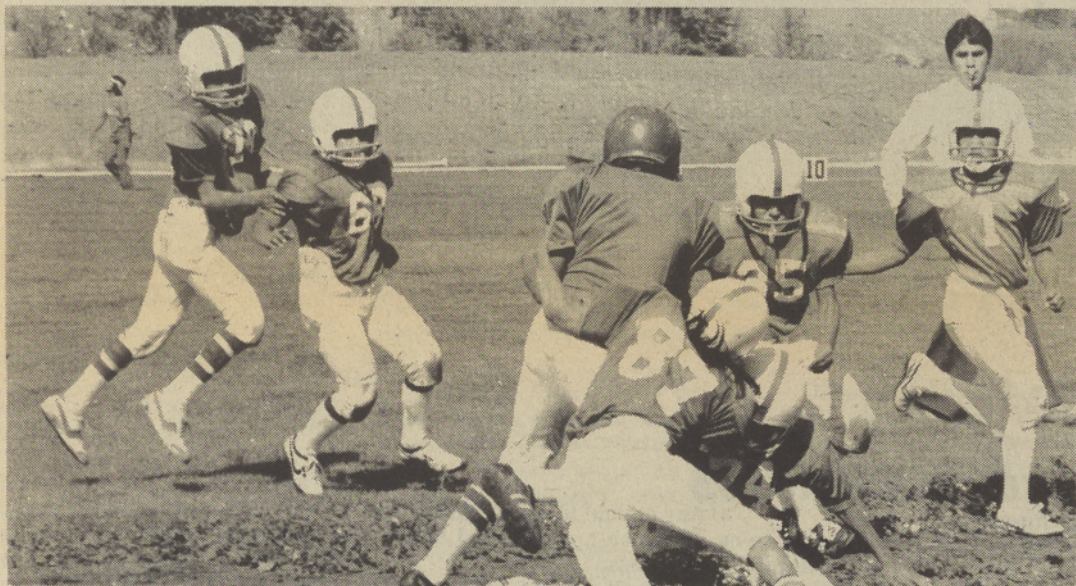
Community Center News

Based on 100 entries, over \$2,300.00 in cash and merchandise will be awarded, plus trophies in each flight, and many special prizes and added money.

Entry fee will be \$49.00 for three days (54 holes). Caddies will be available. Entries will be limited to the first 100 received that are postmarked by October 1. Late entries cannot be guaranteed.

Starting time, October 8, will be at 9:00 a.m., and this will be on the Pine Course at McCormick Ranch, 7505 East McCormick Parkway. The second day of play, October 9, will start at 8:00 a.m., on the Pima Golf Resort, 7331 North Pima Road. Palm Course at the McCormick Ranch has been chosen for the last day, tee off time will be at 8:00 a.m.

There will be three handicap flights, a Callaway flight, and a scratch flight for cash with a minimum of fifteen entries. Also, a women's flight will be on
