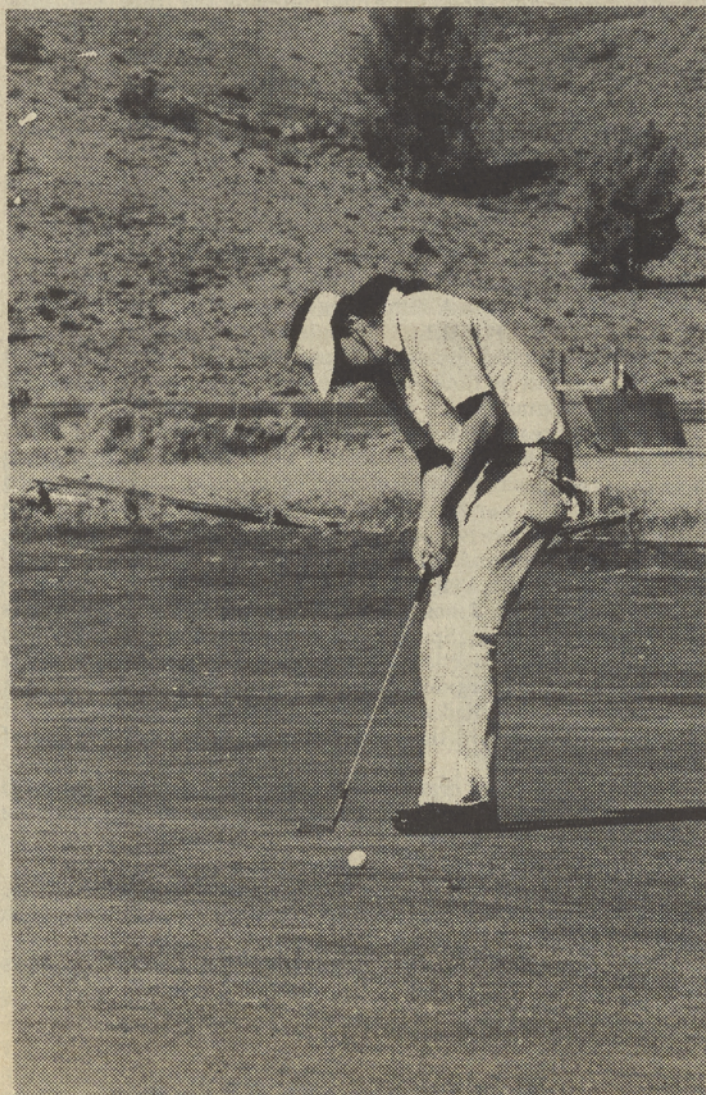

Pitt and Seyler Are Champions

After two days of beautiful fall weather and 36 holes of golf, the Kah-Nee-Ta Golf Association Tournament ended October 2 with two new champions. Louie Pitt finished with a low gross of 139, one under par, and Cecil Seyler came away with the low net at 133.

According to Kah-Nee-Ta Golf Pro Jim Wilkinson, Pitt "played steady for two days and didn't make many mistakes. He's a good player - the best we have."

Eighteen men participated in the tournament, which featured a horse race and the usual

long drive and KP contests.

Pitt's main competition came from Bob Wilkinson who earned a second place with a gross score of 147. Cecil Conner was third with 165 and Mike Clements a close fourth with 166.

The second highest net score was Ray Shike's 135, followed by Everett Miller's 137. Buford Johnson came in fourth with a 138 in the tight competition.

Division I winners of Sunday's horse race were Louie Pitt and Bob Wilkinson. Division II winners were Benson Heath and Al Wyatt.

Special recognition was

given to George Clements who, according to Wilkinson, "stumbled in" Sunday with the high gross of the tournament: a whopping 223.

The next big event at Kah-Nee-Ta Golf Course will be the Pepsi-Cola Pro-Am Tournament, to be held October 29-30. Wilkinson estimated that about fifteen Kah-Nee-Ta players will be invited to play in the tourney. Anyone is welcome to come and watch the Pepsi-Cola Tournament which will begin each day with a shotgun start, depending on the frost and weather conditions.
