

Legal Notice

San Carlos Apache Tribe

Notice is hereby given that the proposed San Carlos Apache payment roll which will be used to distribute per capita judgment funds awarded the tribe in Docket No. 22-D before the claims commission will be posted for a 30-day period effective November 14, 1977. The deadline for filing appeals shall be midnight December 14, 1977.

To be eligible to share in the award, you must have been born on or prior to and living on the

effective date of the plan (December 3, 1975). The tribe established a deadline for accepting enrollment applications for those eligible to share in the payment. Applications for enrollment had to be filed no later than October 15, 1976, to be eligible for participation in the award. Any person wishing to appeal the inclusion or omission of any name on or from the payment roll must make their appeal in writing including any evidence to support the appeal and it must be received by the superintendent, San Carlos Agency, Bureau of Indian Affairs, San Carlos, Arizona 85550 by midnight on December 14, 1977.

Appeals will be handled in accordance with Title 25 of the code of Federal Regulations, Part 42 - Enrollment Appeals.

From the Tribal Drug Program: Prescription Drugs

There are more than 35,000 available drugs each year. Twenty to thirty years ago there were only twelve to fifteen available. Sixty per cent of the population will take prescription drugs, 18 per cent will have adverse reaction and 12,000 will die per year.

What are the problems? There are too many drugs. Doctors cannot keep up with the new information coming in every

day, new drugs, new mixtures which are discovered to be harmful, etc.... There is just no way to stay current to be safe. Drug technology is advancing at a tremendous rate and education is lacking.

A pharmacologist needs at least six to eight years additional schooling once he/she has obtained a PHD degree to make minimum mistakes.

People have false expecta-

tions on what a drug can do. They expect to be cured of whatever is bothering them physically or psychologically. They put pressures on doctors who then over-prescribe. Who has ever heard of going to the doctor's office for some type of ailment and not come out with some type of medicine or a prescription? We can not blame the doctors because many times they are so busy and do not have the time that is needed to be spent with each patient.

Ignorant consumers don't know how to take the drug, they sometimes mix them with other drugs, especially alcohol, and sometimes get adverse reactions. Overdoses are not mainly from illegally obtained drugs, the majority are prescription and over the counter drugs.

How can misuse of prescription and over the counter drugs be controlled? The family medicine chest or the place where you keep your medicine may be the first source of drugs misused by children. It should not be a stockpile of drugs. All members of the family should use drugs only as prescribed and destroy them when they are no longer needed. The consumer should ask the doctor to explain to him/her: (1) What is the chemical (drug)? (2) What part of my body will the drug mainly effect? (3) What are the side effects; will I get dizzy, feel nauseated, etc... (4) Is the dosage in proportion with my body weight? (5) How do I take the drug; swallow it, inject it, ect... (6) Drug interaction; will it interact with coffee, cigarettes, alcohol, birth control pills or any other drug you may be taking. (7) What do you do if you have an allergic reaction?

It is your body and you should be aware of the effects it may have on your body. Drugs are not a toy or a candy, they can cause death. Once you take the drug you must take the ride.
