"Naturally, like the Blazers, everybody will be out to get us," remarked Coach Dave Wiles, now beginning his second season with the Buffs.

Wiles feels the team should be strong this year despite the fact that three of the top guns, Kim Manion, Fran Moses and Barbara Earl have graduated. (Barb and Kim are attending the University of Seattle and Fran is at Mt. Hood Community College.)

Wiles said that, especially in the first part of the season, they may not have quite the high scorers they did last year, but he thinks the team will be better defensively. "Perhaps later in the season we'll have some stronger scoring," he suggested.

The enthusiastic coach said he attended several clinics this past summer where he gained some new ideas. He said he has worked up a lot of new drills and will really be concentrating on defense.

Defense is thought of as "kind of being lazy," he observed. "But when you get right down to it, everything depends on how good your defense is. We never had the high scores at

State that we did in most of our other games last year."

He added that in college, defense is stressed much more than it generally is for High School teams.

The Girls White Buffs had their first practice (turn-out) for experienced players November 7, and those with less experience will begin this week.

Wiles said 33 girls showed up for the first session, and it's pretty difficult to tell at this point just who the starters are going to be. "There are a lot of changes in a person's development and playing ability between the freshman, sophomore and junior years," said Wiles.

Of the Warm Springs girls, he did say the definite possibilities for starters include Mina Shike, Kimiko Danzuka, and perhaps Marla Patt. Others who looked good at the first turnout practice were Arlene Wewa, Georgette Clements, Reva Johnson and Radine Johnson.

Madras returnees who could possibly start are Mary Nelson, Roberta Koch, Joanie Hatfield and Tammy Winterburn.

The first game for this year's Girls White Buffs will be on December 8 at Bend.

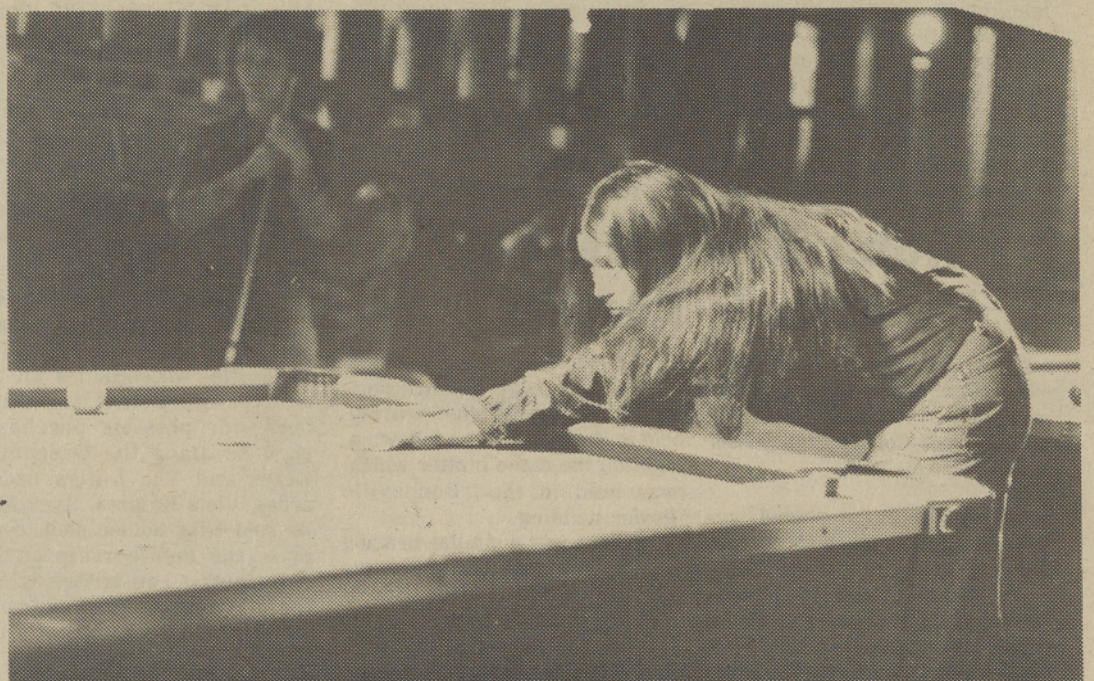
W.S. Bowling League Standings
