In the first game the eight-and-under boys' basketball team was matched against the Pa-poooses. The baby Magpies came out on top, the score being 10 to 8.

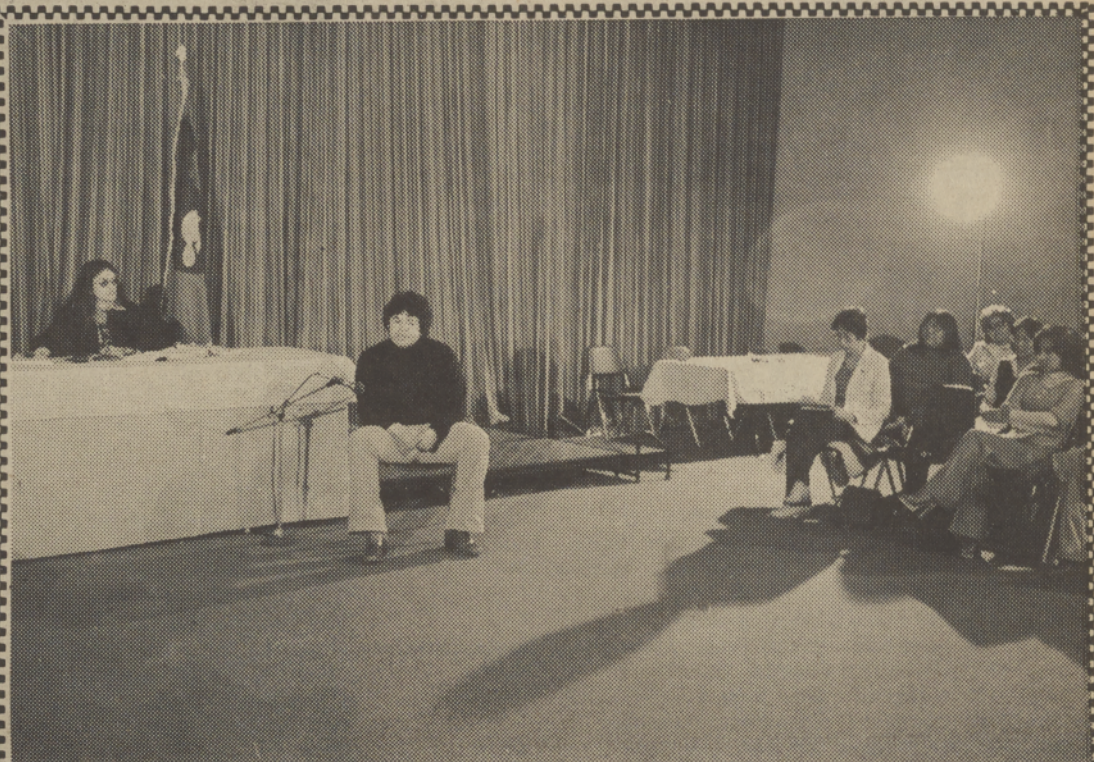
In the second game the nine to eleven year-old boys weren't so lucky. They lost to the Mustangs by a score of 19 to 12.

AILTP Raps Gavel At Model Trial

With an apprehensive and tense feeling in the air, the American Indian Lawyer Training Program started another of its advocacy training sessions at Kah-Nee-Ta January 28 with a "model trial." Approximately 35 trainers and trainees attended the session which involved six days of vigorous and strenuous work.

Model trials are said to enable trainees to better understand their role in Tribal courts and to observe the skills that are required to be effective in actual court cases. The model trial case was an actual custody case involving an 18 month-old girl. These types of civil cases appear often before many judges in Tribal court systems across the United States and, more often than not, clients are not properly represented in Tribal courts because they are not aware of their civil rights.

Warm Springs is very lucky in that they have very competent advocates who have been trained thoroughly through AILTP. Some less fortunate reservations don't even have a Tribal Court system and all their civil and criminal cases are handled by the State. Even when they do have court systems, the judges are often un-knowledgeable concerning procedures and may lack funds to send a person for advocate training. If there is an advocate in the courts, they are often not trained properly and learn by trial and error or by observing

other advocates at work. Dick Trudell, Director of AILTP urges Tribal council to "do good local planning", and that a "good working relationship has to be established between council, Court and the law and Order Committee. Responsibility should be delegated to the Law and Order Committee and the Court should not be controlled by council," according to Trudell.

Trudell also suggested that an effective reporting system should be developed for the Tribal Court judges so that Council is aware of the case load and what is going on within the court. He also stated that the "Warm Springs' law and order code needs revision because it is old. You need to make the laws more personal and closer to the needs of the people." In response to Trudell's statement, Warm Springs Tribal Court judges Irene Wells and Hamilton Greeley stated "The code does need revision, but as judges we can't do anything to change it. The change must come from the Law and Oder committee and the Council."

AILTP assists Indian lawyers in setting up private practice on or near reservations. They supplement their income until the lawyer is financially independent and so that relocation away from the reservation is not necessary. Since there are so few Indian lawyers, an advocate serves the same purpose as the lawyer except that a lay-advocate cannot represent a

lay-person in an outside non-Tribal court.

When asked how Tribal courts can gain respect from outside when they don't have an attorney or someone with credentials Trudell stated, "Do a good job. Remain capable and competent in handling issues of the community. Also, when there is a situation of unwritten policy, write it up. Put the agreement together between State, County and Tribes. Show them (County and State) what power the Tribes have."

There exists opposition to Tribal courts obtaining jurisdiction over non-Indian offenders when they commit an offense on the reservation. "The decision to gain jurisdiction over non-Indian offenders must come from your Tribal Council upon recommendation of the Law and Order Committee," state Judge William Rhodes, from the Gila River Indian community. Rhodes was the first Tribal judge to assert jurisdiction over a non-Indian. Non-Indian offenses have been reduced to one-tenth of what they were five years ago. He accredits this to being sovereign. "If you want to be sovereign, act sovereign. Exercise powers and do it in an orderly and sophisticated way." But he warned, "You cannot use your Tribal Court as a money-making entity."

AILTP anticipates four or five training sessions will be held at Kah-Nee-Ta within the next year. The next session will begin March 17.
