BIA Asks For \$62 Million Increase For 1979

The Bureau of Indian Affairs has requested an increase of \$62.1 million in appropriated funds for fiscal year 1979. The Bureau's request, submitted January 23 to Congress as part of the President's budget, asks for \$949.5 million of Federal appropriation. This includes \$761 million for the operation of Indian programs; \$86.8 million for the construction of irrigation systems, building and utilities; \$71.4 million for road construction, and \$30 million for payments under the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act.

Federal funding for these purposes in fiscal year 1978 was \$846.7 million. The 1979 fiscal year begins October 1, 1978 and ends September 30, 1979.

For Indian education programs — the largest of BIA's programs — \$271 million, an increase of \$11.1 million, was requested. This includes \$41.4 million for higher education assistance grants for approximately 20,000 Indian college students. The request for \$194.7 million for Indian services exceeds 1978 funding by \$18.3 million. These funds are used for tribal governments, social services, law enforcement, Indian self-determination programs and housing. The \$20.3 million for housing will provide for the building of approximately 430 new homes and the renovation and-or enlargement of about 2,650.

The \$70.3 million requested for natural resources development will be used to continue intensive mineral inventories and energy resource development planning. A major program of forest development will be continued and funding of \$3.2 million is requested to continue farm unit development work on the Navajo Indian Irrigation Project. The decrease of \$7 million is the result of Congressional add-ons and supplemental funding requests for drought emergencies in Fiscal Year 1978 not included in the 1979 request.

The FY 1979 request for \$42.4 million for programs to carry out the Federal trust responsibility represents a decrease of \$7.5 million over 1978. The trust responsibility role of the Bureau is the cornerstone of Federal-tribal relationships, and one of the primary goals is to strengthen that role.

The construction program request is \$40.2 million. Requested new construction projects are: Standing Rock Boarding School, North Dakota; Sisseton Boarding School, South Dakota; Kell Indian Junior College, South Dakota; Lower Brule School, South Dakota; Napakiak School, South Dakota; Pine Ridge Rehabilitation Center, South Dakota; Administration Building at Fort Belknap Agency, Idaho; Ft. Thomas Rehabilitation Center, South Dakota; Hopi Rehabilitation Center, Arizona; Ft. Peck Rehabilitation Center, Montana; Northern Navajo Agency Administration Building, Arizona; Coconino Agency Office Building, North Carolina; Navajo Indian Administration Building, New Mexico; and Tulalip Hatchery, Washington.

Bill Returns Oral Bidding For Timber Sale

WASHINGTON — Oregon Congressman Al Ullman this week said the state and the 2nd Congressional District "won a major victory today" when the House of Representatives approved legislation reestablishing oral auction bidding as the predominant means of selling National Forest timber in the West. Action on the bill climaxes more than a year of effort by Ullman and other Western congressmen to require a return to oral auction timber sales in the region.

"The importance of this bill to Oregon and the entire West cannot be over-stated," Ullman said.

"When the Forest Service moved to sealed bid sales early last year, virtually every timber-dependent community in the West found itself in danger of economic disruption each time a major sale went on the block.

"The legislation we passed today will not guarantee that local mills will be the high bidder for all timber sales in their area. But it does insure

such mills an opportunity to meet their competition fairly and obtain the raw material necessary to continue to operate.

"This is especially vital in rural communities where mill operations are primary employers and the foundation of the local economy.

The bill approved by the

House allows the Department of Agriculture to use sealed bidding in certain circumstances if, for example, he thinks it would deter collusive practices.

A bill identical to the House passed legislation has been approved by the Senate already.

Ullman said he will urge President Carter to sign the bill into law promptly.
