

From Seattle University's Head Coach: (Manion and Earl Impressive)

I thought perhaps your readers might enjoy some information regarding the progress of the two Madras High School graduates, Kim Manion and Barb Earl. Both are freshman on our women's basketball team and instrumental to our first year success.

Kim is doing a fine job for us as our starting point guard. She is averaging over 30 minutes of play per game, and runs the offense which I consider a heavy responsibility for any college freshman. But she is adapting

well and her play is improving game by game. She is currently averaging 14.38 points.

Kim's field goal percentage is the team's best at .529. She has a total of 22 assists, second best on the squad. We have great hopes for her. I think she is the class of freshman guards in the Northwest, and has the potential to be one of the tops in the country. Her defense is vastly improved and I personally find her the kind of athlete ever coach dreams about - talented, dedicated and coachable.

Barb has been a pleasant surprise. She provided such excellent play coming off the bench as the 6th man that we moved her into the starting lineup this past game as a short post. Her defense, quickness and rebounding ability are her greatest assets. We plan to convert her to a forward in the future, so she is working steadily on increasing her shooting range and ball handling ability.

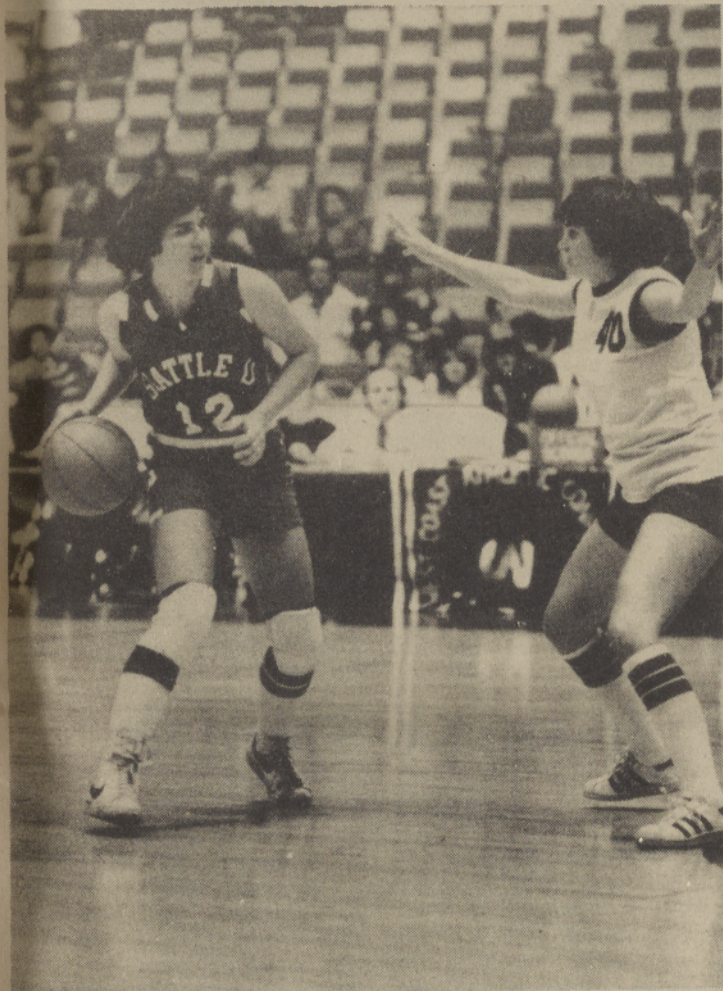
Statistically, she is the team's 3rd leading rebounder, grabbing 46, or an average of 5.88. She is scoring 5.25 points per game, 5th best overall. Barb is an exceptionally hard worker and excellent student enrolled in our nursing program. She is an all-around super kid - a real pleasure to work with.

Our team consists of 6 freshman, 5 of whom start, 2 sophomores and 2 juniors. Despite our inexperience I am pleased with our rapid progress. Currently, we are 5-3.

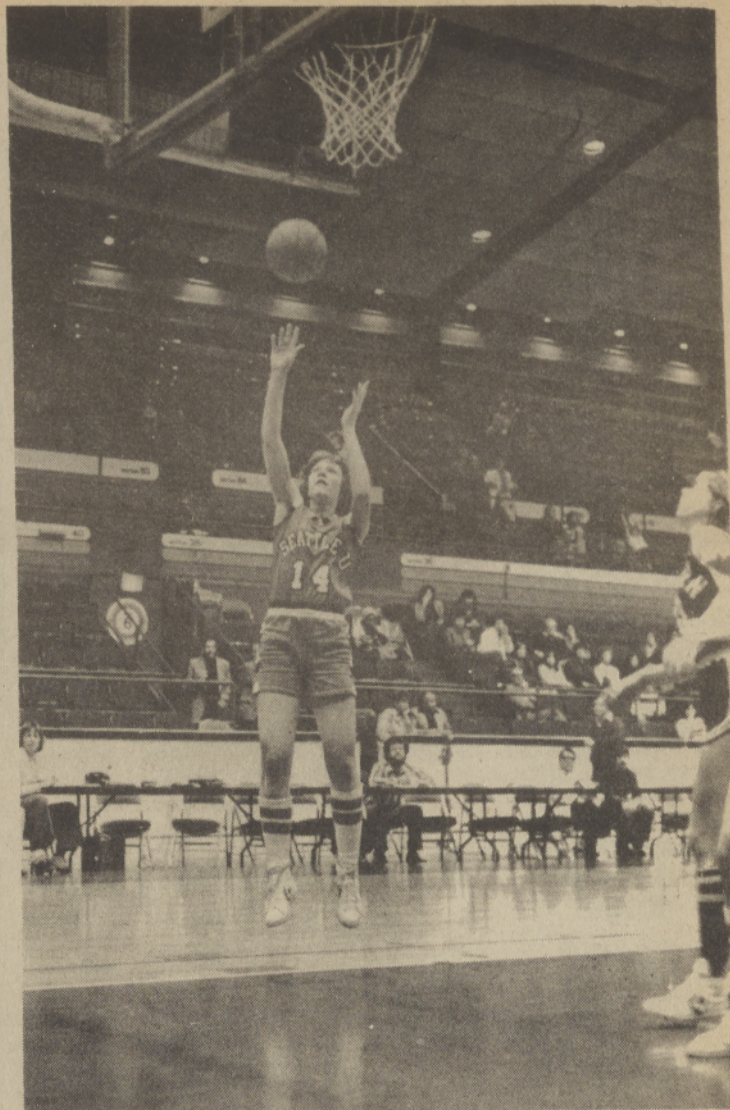

We usually go after opponents with a rugged man-to-man defense, full-court. We like to double team the inbounds pass receiver, and make it tough for teams to get a shot in the 30 seconds allotted. Occasionally we'll zone press, and we fast-break whenever possible.

We'll only get better - youth is not a great disadvantage in this case, because the freshman we have are among the area's best. Barb and Kim are two very special kids. Warm Springs and Madras have a lot to be proud of. We are very fortunate and happy to have this duo as part of our program.

Bowling At Its Best

Tied next are Warm Springs Chevron and Porter House with 17½-18½ each, another tie between Farm Bureau and V.F.W. Post No. 4217 each having a 17-19. The Confederated Tribes have a 15½-20½ record, Thomas Sales and Service 14-22 and tied for the low man of the totem pole it's Warm Springs Athletic Association and Macy's with 12-24 records.

Madras Auto Supply had a hot hand as they managed to take the high team three game series with a total of 2751, next was Confederated Tribes with

2646 and third was the W.S. Athletic Association with 2642.

Dick Souers got his act together and bombed the guy right out of the High Individual three-game series with a total of 735. John Wright had a 697 total and Gerald Nicodemus 3rd with 619.

The Warm Springs Athletic Association rolled at total of 970 to take first in the high team game, 2nd was Madras Auto Supply and Confederated Tribes as each rolled a 936 game apiece, Kah-Nee-Ta was third with 928.

For the high individual game, Firehand Dick Souers rolled a 268 and a 278 as he burned out first place, John Wright was second with a 262 and Gerald Nicodemus third with 237.
