Duties: Adds daily log scale tickets submitted by scalers for accuracy of piece number and volume by species. All items are designated by numerical codes and must be checked for correct designation. Checks log truck tickets turned in by scalers against log scale tickets to be sure all loads are identified correctly by logging unit, scaling unit and truck number. Checks all log truck tickets against ticket stubs to ensure that all logs recorded as removed from sale areas have been received at the scaling

stations. Maintains a scale ticket and a log ticket book accountability register.

Prepares daily and monthly scale sheet summaries. Checks daily and monthly volume by species by unit with Warm Springs Forest Products Industries Log Scale Clerk and certifies that a check has been made. Performs other duties as assigned.

- SILETZ MEMBERSHIP ROLL

Portland - A membership roll of the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians of Oregon will be prepared under the provisions of the Siletz Restoration Act, P.L.95-195, enacted November 18, 1977. The following persons who were living on May 16, 1978, are eligible for enrollment and must have an application filed by or on their behalf:

1. All persons who, on August 13, 1954, were entitled to appear on the Siletz final roll but were not listed, and

2. Descendants of a person whose name appears on the final membership roll and who possesses at least 1/4 degree of blood of members of the tribe or their Siletz Indian ancestors.

3. Descendants of a person whose name was entitled to appear on the Siletz final roll and possesses at least 1/4 degree of blood of members of the tribe or their Siletz Indian ancestors.

The persons whose names are listed on the 1954 final roll do not need to file an application. However, they should furnish their current addresses to the Tribe or Area Director for tribal purposes.

The American Indian Film Festival '78 will get underway Thursday, May 11th. The second annual event will be staged at the Palace of Fine Arts Theater - San Francisco, California.

This year the festival will be featuring Indian picture actors such as Raymond Tracy, Will Sampson, Charlie Hill, Tenaya Torres, just to name a few.

This will mark a first-time special presentation of the American Indian motion picture awards, "Indian Oscar." This event will take place on the concluding night. The awards will include Best Picture, Best Actor and Actress, as well as other awards. This is the first of its kind to be staged in the country and as it appears this

will become an annual event.

On Thursday, May 11, at 7:30 p.m. the features will include "New Indians" narrated by Robert Redford, also "Battle of Crow Foot," and Indian Rights-Indian Law.

Friday, May 12, at 11:30 a.m. the features will be Fort Good Hope, The Cree Way, Dawn Riders and Amiotte. At 7:30 p.m. the features are Nanook Taxi and House Made of Dawn.

On Saturday, May 13, 11:30 a.m. features will be "The Price We Paid," "The People Are Dancing Again," "Dol-Ceta Part I," "Arrow Creek," and "Indians Helping Indians." That evening at 7:30 "Mother of Many Children," will be viewed.

And last but not least, which is of great interest to this area, "Three Warriors," will be shown. This should be one of the main attractions of the entire event as this film was made here in Warm Springs, with several local's participating in this fine picture.

Following this the oscar awards will take place concluding a worthwhile event.

Saul Zaentz and Keith Merrill will be among other dignitaries present for this year's occasion.
