Contamination Of Marijuana With Paraquat

Recently many people have been concerned about reports of marijuana being contaminated with chemicals that are causing illness among smokers of marijuana. One such known chemical that is being used is paraquat.

Since 1975, the Mexican government has been operating a marijuana eradication program. In other words, a program to exterminate marijuana. The chemical is manufactured in Mexico and in the United States. Paraquat is sprayed from aircraft onto marijuana plants. The chemical works when it interacts with sunlight to cause the plants to die within the course of roughly 48 hours.

Paraquat in concentrated form is highly toxic and has been responsible for at least 25 deaths in the United States due to accidental poisoning and suicides. Paraquat tends to concentrate in lung tissue, whether it is ingested or inhaled. When the chemical reacts with the lung, it produces a condition called fibrosis, which reduces the capacity of the lung to absorb oxygen. Inhalation of paraquat creates a greater risk of lung damage than if you ingest the same amount.

Marijuana sprayed with paraquat can be quickly harvested before the plant dies. In such cases, harvested contaminated marijuana may find its way to this country. Roughly 60 percent of marijuana in the United States is imported from Mexico. During the past year there has been increasing concern of the possibility of paraquat contaminated marijuana was entering the United States and might pose health hazards to marijuana users.

There is a vast difference

between consuming marijuana and smoking marijuana when it is contaminated with paraquat. There are still studies going on but the distinction between consuming and smoking is clear. Consuming the chemical in marijuana creates less hazard. Smoking the chemical presents the greatest potential hazard. It depends on the amount of the

chemical present and how much a person smokes. It is known that marijuana causes adverse lung effects over a period of time. Therefore, if paraquat is present it would add to the adverse effects of the lung. To date the permanent effects of marijuana are uncertain, but paraquat effects, once they occur, would be permanent.

Childhood Immunization

This is the second of two articles dealing with the subject of childhood immunizations. The first article appeared in the April 7th issue and dealt with the "three-in-one" immunization: the DPT (diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus).

Over the past 10 years or so the number of childhood immunizations has fallen to a dangerously low level nation-wide. During the next two years a national emphasis will be placed on increasing the immunization level among children throughout the country.

The State of Oregon was among the early states in recognizing the problem of inadequate childhood immunizations and in 1973 passed a state law requiring certain immunizations to be completed prior to admission to any private or public school.

At Warm Springs the level of childhood immunizations is increasing and hopefully will be above 95 per cent within the next several months. In order for childhood immunizations to take place on schedule, it's important that parents understand which ones are required and when they should take place.

Through the development of the Oral Polio vaccine in the 50's the number of polio cases in the

U.S. has dropped to a few dozen a year. The risk of becoming a victim of polio is still a possibility for those who have not received the vaccine.

This vaccine is the only one which is given orally - frequently a drop of vaccine on a sugar cube is the method of giving it. It is recommended that an infant receive the first dose at two months with a second given at four months and a third at 18 months. A booster is recommended at 5 to 6 years of age prior to starting grade school.

Finally we come to the combination measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine. The immediate effects of those three diseases are usually fairly mild. However, the complications may be very serious and it is for this reason that the vaccine is given. Usually this is a one-time immunization and it is recommended that it be given at fifteen months of age.

As is true with any immunization, some people will experience some discomfort and a few may show reactions. Recently, the clinic has special-ordered wallet sized immunization record cards. They are available through the public health nurse and maternal and child health office.
