

Sue Gangler Moving to Costa Rica

Extension Agent here since September 1975, Sue Gangler is leaving Warm Springs for a 15-month stint in Costa Rica.

She will be one of two who will be working on 4-H nutrition projects as well as training other extension agents there.

"It's the sort of thing I've wanted to do for a long time," she said. "I've always been in-

terested in living in another country and in traveling — and I particularly like working in the field of nutrition," she added.

Sue will spend three months in the capitol city of San Jose to study the language, then will spend a year developing and implementing 4-H in nutrition projects in other areas of Costa Rica.

During her two and a half years here, Sue has tried to center her Family Life and 4-H programs around community interests and needs.

With 4-H, she has tried to tie the activities of the clubs to Indian values and interests such as beadwork, bustle-making, and the delivery of fruit baskets to senior citizens at Christmas.

The Family Life program was particularly rewarding for Sue and she stresses that she really enjoyed home visits and meeting people. However, when Sue first arrived she said she was "really surprised to find out that some people really have very ferocious watch-geese on their ranches!"

"Overall, I've really enjoyed Warm Springs," she says sincerely. "It's one of the best experiences I've had. I've enjoyed the last couple of years so much."

Indoor Plants Benefit From Being Outside in Summer

After spending the winter in the house, indoor plants often seem to benefit from being placed outside for the summer.

When putting houseplants outside, keep their light needs in mind.

"No indoor plants should be put where they will be in full sunlight all day," says Duane Hatch, Oregon State University Extension home gardening coordinator.

Plants whose leaves have streaks, marks or patches of different colors don't tolerate a great deal of light. They should be placed in dense shade along with those plants that are recommended for low light intensities when indoors.

Those low light plants in-

clude Chinese evergreens, jades, sansevieria, English ivy, bamboo and parlor palms and pewee plants. If unsure about other low light plants, consult an indoor plant book or experts at a local plant store.

Plants requiring intermediate light intensity will do well in partial shade. Examples include rubber plants, heart-leaf and fiddle-leaf philodendrons, several types of dracaena, asparagus ferns and dumbcane.

Once outdoors, the soil in the pot is likely to dry out faster than indoors. Hatch advises keeping a close check on soil moisture and perhaps watering more often than when the same plants are in the home.

Turquoise Sale

Weatherization Services

The Warm Springs Tribal Grants Department has announced the award of a Grant through the State of Oregon, from its Community Services Administration to the Confederated Tribes.

The money would allow families who qualify as senior citizens, handicapped, or with an annual income within the poverty range to have their homes inspected and minor repairs done. The repairs would have to be related to heat loss problems within the house. Things such as broken windows, storm windows, loose or broken siding, holes in floors, would qualify. These funds cannot be spent for remodeling a home or adding on to an existing home.

This Grant is small as to the dollar amount, however, it may provide some needed help. Presently, the Tribal Grants Department is preparing another grant application. If awarded, more than eighty reservation homes would be weatherized.

Locals Study Reality Therapy

An in-depth follow-up session in Reality Therapy held at the Community Center May 8 through 12 and conducted by Dr. Gary Applegate was attended by twenty people, seven of whom have been invited to Los Angeles this August for certification training in Reality Therapy.

The seven who have been invited for the certification training are Ernie Keplin, Caroline Cruz, Papo Cruz, Marie Calica, Delson Suppah, Dale Cochran and Bob Parker.

According to Ernie Keplin, Warm Springs Director of Alcohol and Drug Programs, those who become certified will be able to work in any program across the nation. He said the certification program is significant because program directors look for certified counselors in a treatment field such as Reality Therapy, Gestalt Therapy, T.A., or other motivational techniques. Those who are certified can also train others in the branch.

Reality Therapy is a treatment technique that helps a person change undesirable behavior patterns and start looking at new and more positive ways of doing things. Basically, it means, stop blaming and face up. Keplin feels that Reality Therapy fits Indian treatment situations better than Gestalt Therapy. And he adds that it is easy to pick up and can be used to great advantage more quickly than other treatment techniques.

Farewell for Chinns

Calvin Chinn, who has been pastor of the Warm Springs Presbyterian Church since December 1972, is leaving to accept a position with the San Francisco Theological Seminary in San Anselmo, California. He will be instructor in ministry, serving as pastor to students and

their families, as well. There will be a farewell potluck on Wednesday, June 14, at the Community Center at 6 p.m. The entire community is invited and asked to bring salads and/or desserts to accompany the main dishes which are being provided by the church families.
