## JACKSON WINS FRIED BREAD OPEN

The winner of the championship flight of last weekend's Fried Bread Open golf tournament at Kah-Nee-Ta was not playing like a champ on Saturday. But by Sunday Charles Jackson was hot and the rest were not and he walked away a winner.

"All the luck that eluded me on Saturday managed to catch up with me on Sunday," Jackson remarked later. His eight over par improved overnight to a one under par for a combined gross of 147 on 36 holes. He wound up just one point ahead of second place Louie Pitt.

Jackson, who was club champion of the Kah-Nee-Ta Men's Golf Association in 1976, attributed his most recent success to "proper training the night before and keeping my

head down." Pointers from Kah-Nee-Ta golf pro Jim Wilkinson proved to be helpful.

Admitting that he has been known as a one tournament a season golfer, Jackson said he expects to play more this year. Perhaps his \$150 gift certificate for the Pro Shop was partial incentive.

Other locals fared well in the classic tourney, now in its sixth year. Levi Bobb took low net in the first flight with a 130. Mark Massey won low gross in second flight with a 163.

Over \$2000 in merchandise prizes were awarded. A raffle at the special banquet Saturday night produced a host of other winners, who took home such valuable items as a wrist watch, golf accessories, beadwork and gift certificates.

the arena and occasionally mumbling something about "sunny beaches".

In some unplanned rodeo action, Delvis Heath had a run-in with a rather large, surly, and thankfully hornless bull. The rider was temporarily atop the bull, only to be angrily shed after a short ride. After reaching the chutes he must have recognized "Bullneck" from somewhere, and trotted over to give him an affectionate, but sound, butt on the chest.

After discovering that the "tender feelings" were not returned, the bull again trotted around the arena and repeated

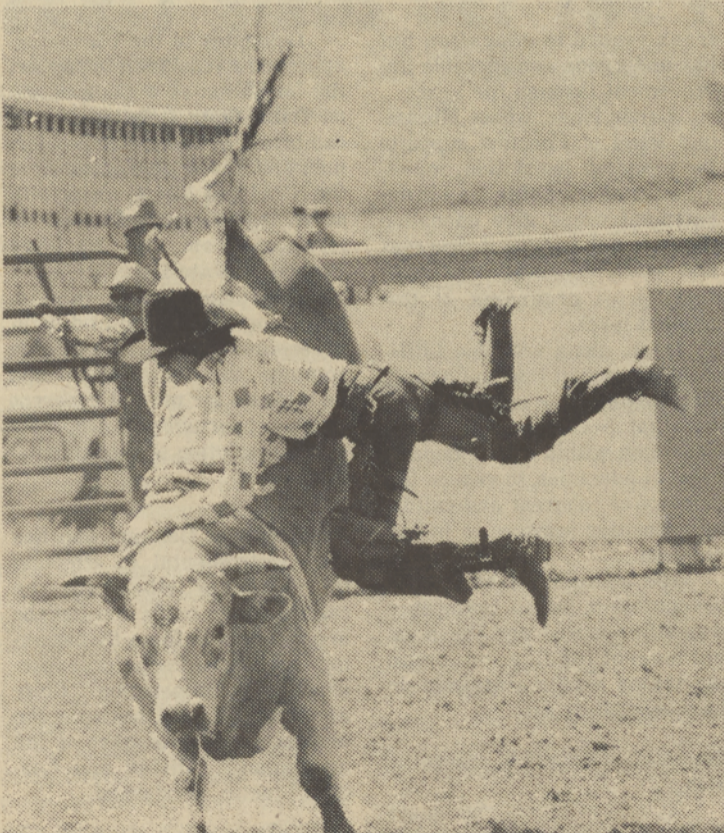

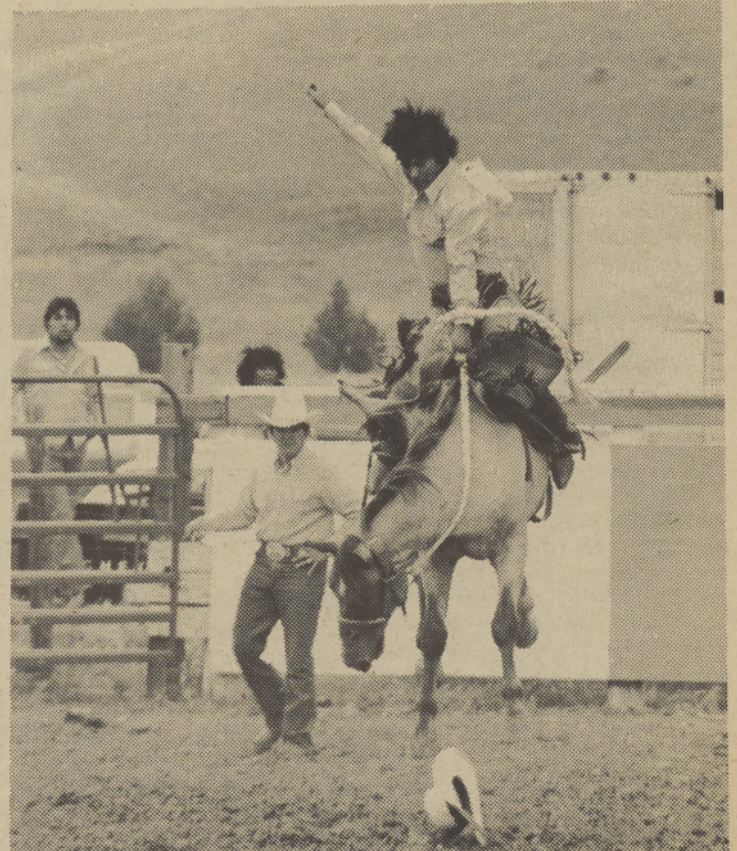
