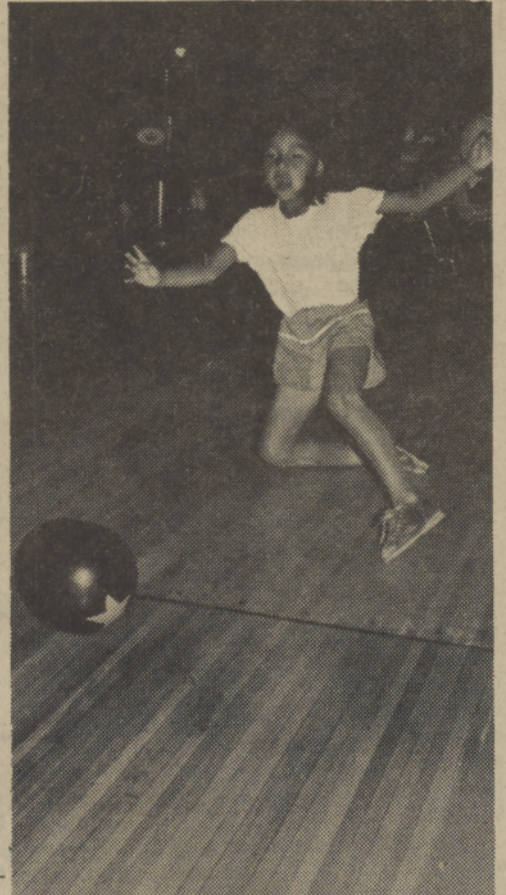
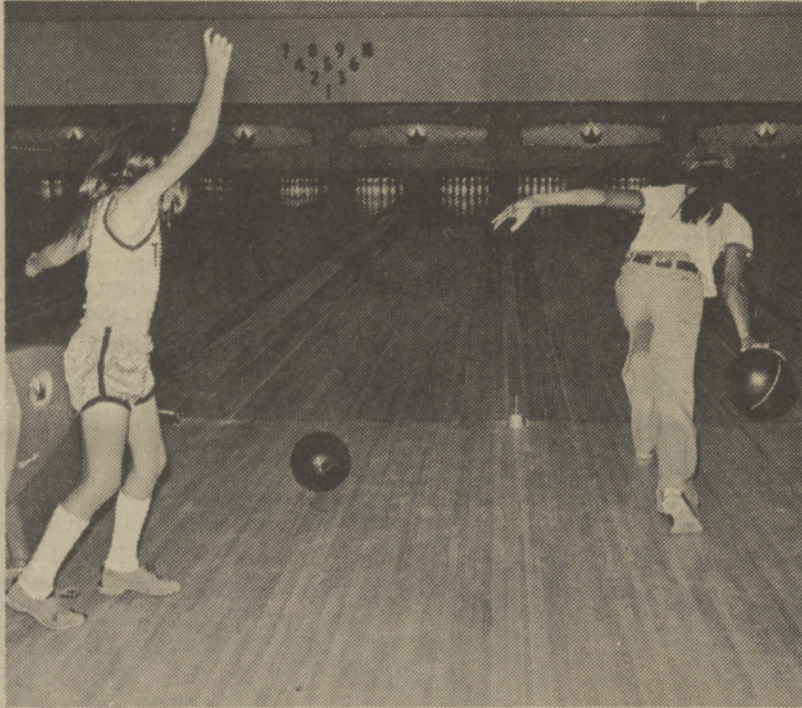

Locals Stay Cool At Indoor Rodeo

Jazzy Wewa won the wild horse race at the All-Indian Rodeo in Portland and Carmela Scott placed second in the barrel Race. The rodeo sponsored by the Willamette Valley Indian Rodeo Committee drew top caliber Indian cowboys and cowgirls to the (PI) Pacific International Expo Center in north Portland on the weekend of August 4, 5, and 6th. Contestants from throughout the northwest and Canada provided plenty of action during the three-day rodeo.

There were nearly twenty contestants from Warm Springs entered in the rodeo. The competition was tough in each event but was full of excitement throughout the three-day affair. The rodeo was held in conjunction with the Multnomah County Fair. Spectators were satisfied with the action provided by the Indian cowboys, but because of the lack of advertising there were not capacity crowds at the performances.

For the All-Around champion cowboy there were two titles that went to two separate individuals. One was the winner of the events in the rough stock and a timed event which was

won by John Colliflower who received a saddle for his efforts in that category. The other was the winner for any two events with the highest winnings and that went to Mel Joseph who received the Commissioner's Trophy.

The results in each event went as follows: in the saddle bronc competition the winner was Jerry Sam of Omak, Washington, second place was shared by Richard Lewis and Oliver Lewis both from Vernon, British Columbia. Third was also split by Charlie Louis and Bill Veldez.

In the bareback competition Vince Garcie emerged champion with Ted Hurtado second, Jerry Sam third, and Monty Calkin fourth. Mike Olney won the steer wrestling, Byron Chaney second and Rocky Avery third.

The bull riding event provided thrills for the spectators and gave the cowboys plenty of action. The winner for that event was Vern Holly, second place was Oliver Pimms, third Gary Sam and fourth went to Larry Condon. Condon is almost a legend in the rodeo game, his main event during the years being the bull riding.

The calf roping provided some thrills as the calves gave the cowboys some bad times during the event. But at the end Mel Joseph came out the winner with Fred Kinnerson second, Bozo Sampson third and Todd Cline fourth.

The cowgirls had their day in the rodeo as they performed in the barrel race and all had very good time. At the end Terry

Shaw of Estacada was the winner, Carmela Scott a local girl here in Warm Springs was second, Larrine Hall third and Margie Walker fourth.

The team roping takes the skill of two cowboys who head and heel the steer. There is a five second penalty if a cowboy catches only one leg, but the times were very good at the show as the team of Ralph Rogers and Roger Williams were the winners with Randy Rogers and Mel Joseph second, Gerald Camarillo and Carl Johnson third, and Wes Williams and Fred Williams fourth.

The wild cow milking, try this in a tough situation for getting some milk for your "MUSH." The roper uses a mucker to aid him in this event, and must have at least a drop of milk to qualify. The winner in this event was Fred Williams, second went to Wes Williams, third was Mel Joseph and fourth went to Roger Williams.

The wildhorse race was a winner-take-all affair. Jazzy Wewa won that event and he seems to be dominating that event around this area.

Rodeo stock was furnished by John Beard of Ellensburg, Washington. The announcing was done by an outstanding rodeo announcer Mel Lambert from Salem, Oregon. Lambert, a veteran at the rodeo game thought the competition was superb with the caliber of Indian cowboys that performed in the rodeo.

Open Jackpot Rodeo

Once again the Warm Springs Rodeo Association, has made plans to sponsor another rodeo, on September 9-10, 1978.

All of the following events will be Jackpot, (no purse added) they include Saddle Bronc, Bareback, Wild Horse Race, Team roping, Calf Roping, Cow Milking, Womens Barrel Race. The above events have an entry fee of \$27.50. In the Team Roping it is \$27.50 per man.

The Youth events include Novice Barrel Race (12 (12 & under), Jr. Cow Riding (16 & under), these events have a \$1.00 entry fee. All of the Junior and Senior events will be just one go round per day.

All the stock will be furnished by local people from the reservation. A \$5.00 stock charge will be taken out. All of the stock events will be chute run.

The Warm Springs Barrel Racing Association has tentatively planned a womens - youth playday, both days of the rodeo, to begin at 10:30 a.m. If interested call (503) 553-1456 after September 1, evenings only.

Entries will be taken at the rodeo grounds before 12:00 noon both days, sign up when you get there. The association will not accept checks. Payoffs will be each day after the show.

Admission is \$2.00 for adults, \$1.00 for children, and Senior Citizens will get in free.
