## 509-J ATHLETIC CODE RULES

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Because it is a privilege to participate in athletics, student athletes must assume certain obligations and responsibilities beyond those set for students in general. The following rules and regulations pertain to student athletes participating in the athletic program at Madras High school:

1. Student athletes are prohibited from using illegal drugs, narcotics, tobacco or drinking intoxicating beverages, and behaving in a manner detrimental to the athletic program. When a high school coach determines that a violation has occurred during the attendance or participation in any school sponsored activity, or when under the supervision of a district staff member, or when a district buildings and grounds, the student athlete will be suspended from athletics as follows:

First Offense — The STUDENT athlete will be suspended FROM THE ATHLETIC PROGRAM for the current season.

Second Offense — The STUDENT athlete will be suspended FROM THE ATHLETIC PROGRAM for the remainder of the current SCHOOL year.

When a high school coach determines that a violation as above has occurred, but not during a school sponsored event, or under the supervision of a district staff member, nor on district buildings and grounds, the student athlete will be suspended from athletics as follows:

First Offense — Punishment will be determined by the appropriate head coach, the activities director, and principal, after a conference with the student and parent-guardian. The minimum penalty will be suspension from the following two interscholastic contests.

Second offense — The student athlete will be suspended from the athletic program for the current season.

Third Offense — The student athlete will be suspended from the athletic program for the remainder of the current school year.

2. Unsportsmanlike conduct will not be tolerated. The APPROPRIATE HEAD COACH WILL determine TREATMENT OF OFFENDERS AND INFORM THE ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR OF ANY PUNISHMENT ADMINISTERED.

3. A STUDENT ATHLETE WHO MISSES PRACTICE must make arrangements TO BE EXCUSED WITH THE HEAD COACH. A STUDENT athlete may check out of school through the office with a legitimate excuse such as illness or parent request AND BE EXCUSED FROM PRACTICE.

4. A STUDENT athlete must attend school a minimum of one-half day on the day of a contest in order to participate in that contest. Exceptions may be made if the absence was due to a school activity or if the absence is approved by the principal or his DESIGNEE.

5. An unexcused absence from an athletic contest will cause dismissal from the team. The DELINQUENT athlete may appeal the dismissal directly to the Activities Director and the appropriate head coach.

6. IF A STUDENT ATHLETE DESIRES TO CHANGE SPORTS DURING A SEASON IN PROGRESS, he-she may do so only with the consent and approval of both head coaches and the Activities Director. The approval of the head coach of the sport from WHICH he-she is dropping must be obtained first.

7. Parents and guardians of STUDENT athletes are encouraged to attend a meeting explaining the responsibilities and training policies of Madras High STUDENT athletes.

8. STUDENT athletes must meet all eligibility requirements set by Madras High School, THE DISTRICT BOARD, and the Oregon School Activities Association.

9. All athletes must have on file a certificate of physical examination and parent consent prior to participation in any sport INCLUDING practice.

10. STUDENT ATHLETES ARE NOT INSURED BY THE DISTRICT WHILE PARTICIPATING IN PRACTICES OR CONTESTS. THE PARENT-GUARDIAN AND/OR STUDENT ATHLETES MUST ASSUME FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS DUE TO INJURY OR ACCIDENT RESULTING FROM ATHLETIC PARTICIPATION.

11. THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE RULES ABOVE ARE SUBJECT TO THE RIGHTS OF DUE PROCESS AND STUDENTS' WILL BE AFFORDED THE SAME RIGHTS AS GUARANTEED IN THE DISCIPLINARY PROCESS ELSEWHERE IN DISTRICT POLICY, RULES AND REGULATIONS.

## BITS AND PIECES

**Tribal Administration** - During the later part of July and the first part of August the General Manager along with the branch managers have been reviewing the '79 budgets with all the supervisors. From the latest reports everything turned out just fine. The next step is to put the entire budget together for the Tribal Council's review during the later part of August and the earlier part of September.

**Wasco County Fair at Tygh Valley**, 30 miles south of The Dalles, will be held August 24 - 25 - 26. A Premium for all Indian bead work and Indian handicraft is available at the Extension office and at other outlets. There will be a Tepee en-

campment on the grounds, and it was reported that there will be no vehicles allowed in the Tepee areas except for unloading and loading the camp.

To be eligible for compensation, Indians in parade should be in full regalia for either walking or riding horseback.

Any mounted Indian Princess riding in the Grand Entry Saturday evening and Sunday afternoon will receive an award of \$25. She must be dressed in full Indian Regalia and be registered at the Fair Office by Saturday 6 p.m. A committee appointed by the Fair Board will select a Princess.

Kids day has been designated for August 24th with special entertainment and prizes such as tickets to Carnival rides and

other prizes as decided by the Fair Board. There will be Indian horse races each day subject to participation.

**Warm Springs Housing Authority** reports that there are tenants reviving their lawns despite the shortage of water at this time of the year. The water situation usually is a problem. The Housing Authority reports that another new home has been occupied by Vernon Spino and his family near Sinnasho.

The Community Center has had its hands full all summer long with various projects and other activities. At the present time staff members are on annual leave leaving the work force short handed.
