

Upriver Fishing Begins

Indian fishermen cast their nets in the Columbia River above Bonneville Dam today on the first of 27 days of commercial fishing.

They face the prospect of a healthy run of fall salmon and a possible catch of 110,000 fish.

Their lower river counterparts caught 37,900 fish during the short 4-day season that ended August 21, according to the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife preliminary catch estimates. This is 2100 fewer fish than they were allowed under the Columbia River Management plan.

Indians are being compensated this year for the loss they suffered when the 1977 upriver fall season was cut short due to an unexpectedly poor run.

At a news conference held yesterday by the Columbia River Inter-Tribal fish commission, fishermen were informed of this year's extremely low return of steelhead to the river — "mesh restrictions will be enforced and fishermen are being asked to limit the incidental catch of steelhead as much as possible."

Indian Atlas Seeks Local Input

Oregon Indian history and contemporary concerns will soon be presented in an atlas format by a Portland-based CETA project. The Atlas of Oregon Indians, scheduled for publication in February 1979, is currently soliciting input from Indian communities across the state.

Project members are compiling map data on traditional Oregon cultures, on changing Indian status after 1800, and on the wide range of modern Indian activities. The booklet will attempt to show in graphic form some of the many achievements of Oregon Indian people past and present.

The five-member team of the Atlas of Oregon Indians is consulting with the Oregon Indian Education Association, the Northwest Regional Educational Lab Indian Program, and with many tribal and local Indian organizations.

Direct input from Oregon Indian people is vital in order to give the ATLAS its proper aim

and relevance. In order to encourage local participation, rough drafts will be distributed this fall to any Indian program expressing an interest in reviewing the tentative maps and outlines.

Comments and suggestions

Report Appliance Fires
