## Little Guys Football

October 7 was the kick-off date for the local kids football for this year. Warm Springs hosted the Lummi Indian Reservation team from Washington here on a hot autumn afternoon.

The first game starting at 12 noon saw the kids from six to ten years old pair off. A couple of weeks of hard practice and good coaching was the main deciding factor as the local boy's rambled over Lummi to the tune of 26-0.

The visitors won the toss and elected to receive. After three plays they punted and the ball was blown dead on the 40 yard line. Warm Springs had the ball and from the very first play of the game, quarterback Tony Stacona handed off to fullback Kevin "Fish" Blueback who circled his right end and scooted 40 yards for the touchdown giving the boys a 6-0 lead. The P.A.T. attempt was no good. But from that point on the locals were in complete control of the game, giving the visitors only three plays during their possession of the ball.

Warm Springs next score came on an option run play. The quarterback decided to keep the ball and ran into the end zone. The P.A.T. was good on a pass from Stacona to Donny Bagley giving them the lead of 13-0.

From that point on Warm Springs substituted freely using all the boys on the squad. Even the six year old boys got a piece of the action. Some of them look as though they can just carry their pads and couldn't weigh 50 lbs. soaking wet. They were just cute.

Here is a list of the starters, at center, Butch David; guards were Leroy Allen and Sheldon Sutterlee; tackles, Carl Tewee and Willis Miller; ends, Donny Bagley and Theron Thomas; slotback, Tray Leonard; fullback, "Fish" Blueback; tailback, David Lucei and Quarterback, Tony Stacona.

The six to ten year olds are idle this week but will see action next week, October 28, as they will host the Yakima Nation team here. Yakima, always a

contender, should give the boys a good game.

Well, at this point things were all in Warm Springs' favor then the eleven to fourteen year olds took to the field. The visitors boys, with a little more football savvy, proved just that as the game was a hard-fought, shoulder pad popping game. A deadlock throughout the first quarter, but in the second stanza the visitors scored to give them first blood. The P.A.T. attempt was stopped short of the goal line, but now they were ahead 6-0.

It wasn't until mid-way through the fourth and final quarter when Warm Springs managed to push the ball into pay dirt with a pass from quarterback Jason Smith to runningback Darin Tewee. The P.A.T. was no good leaving the score 6-6.

All the locals must have had a rabbit's foot on him because there were two touchdowns called back on penalties, the infraction was offensive holding which was very costly for the visiting team.

Coach Campy said, "What kept us in the game was our defense." Especially from Tyrone Tewee, Tony Thompson and Steve Smith. They played exceptionally well up front.

Each time Lummi tried the center runs they came out minus one or two yards each time. Our pass defense was not up to par as they scored two touchdowns but they were nullified because of illegal use of hands, Campy said.

On offense we were not executing our plays the way we should have and had to give up the ball several times. We will have to work harder on our offensive plays. It's hard to have all the boys here each day for practice, Campy added.

On October 22, the 11-14 year olds will travel to Neah Bay, Washington. They don't have a 6-10 year old team there.

The whole course of our last game was our defense and we were lucky to come out with a tie the coach said.

## "One Day" All-Indian Rodeo

The Warm Springs Rodeo Association is sponsoring a one-day rodeo this coming November 4. The rodeo is sanctioned by the Oregon Indian Cowboys Association (OICA).

Events include: Saddle Bronc, Bareback, Team Roping (2 loops-enter twice), Calf Roping, Wild Cow Milking, Barrel Race, Wild Horse Race, Entry fee for each event is \$30.00, which

includes a five dollar stock charge. All of the stock will come from the Warm Springs Reservation. In each of the seven events, there will be a \$75.00 added purse.

Judges for the rodeo will include one OICA judge, and the other one will be elected by the rough stock riders at the rodeo.

Rules for the rodeo are: entrants must be enrolled in a recognized tribe or be a mini-

mum of 1/4 degree Indian blood and able to provide proof if requested.

Entries open continuously through Thursday, November 2 at 5:00 p.m. Personal checks will be accepted from OICA members.
