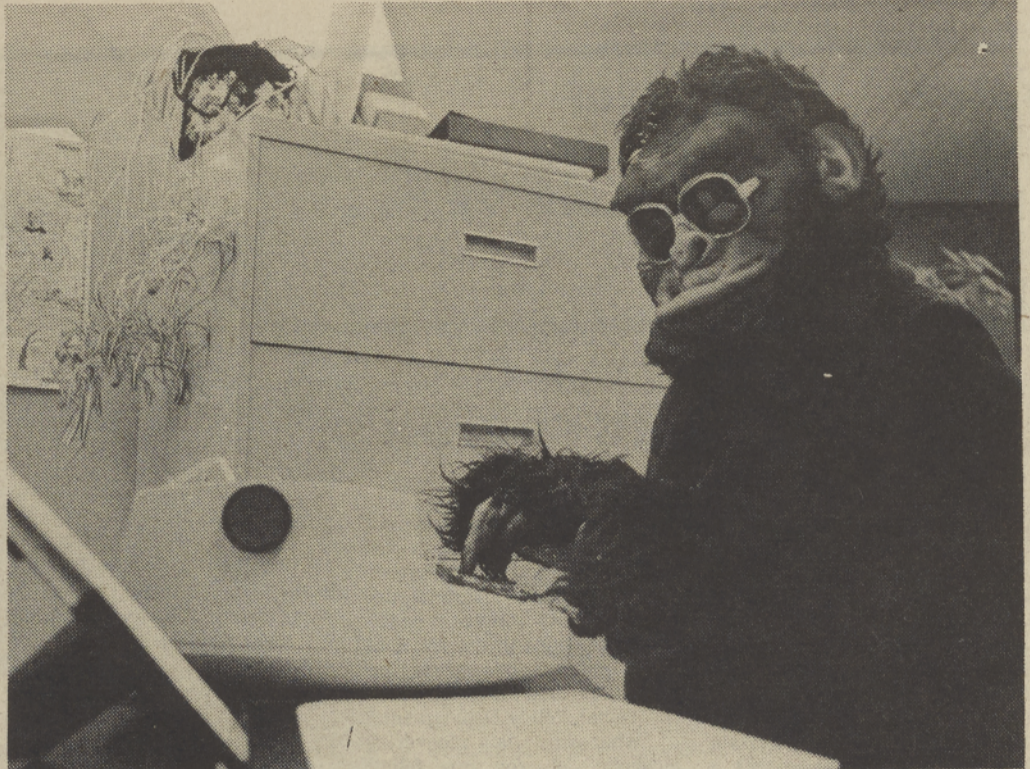




COME IN — Lizzie Borden (Billie Jo McConville) won "Most original costume" in the office dress-up contest.

Police Report

Burglaries made for busy weekend

The assistant police tribal chief's office looks like a ski shop after the confiscation of \$1-2000 worth of stolen ski clothing that was being sold to employees at Kah-Nee-Ta while three former Kah-Nee-Ta employees sit in Hood River County Jail on charges of burglary.

Assistant chief Dick Montee reported that the three were charged with breaking into the ski shop at Mount Hood Meadows, where they were employed at the time, stealing the merchandise, and taking it to Kah-Nee-Ta to sell to former co-workers. One employee blew the whistle, however, and Miller was apprehended by Kah-Nee-Ta security man Richard Gunzenhauser early Friday morning October 27. His accomplice, Ken Schwander, was picked up at noon that day when he attempted to bail Miller out of jail. A third suspect, Cliff Bald, was arrested Monday October 30 in Madras and taken to Hood River County.

A sworn statement from Jerry Heidebrecht, who is an auditor at Kah-Nee-Ta and the food and beverage manager at Mount Hood Meadows, describes the method by which the burglars apparently entered the shop and made off with the clothing.

It is not known exactly how much merchandise was stolen

nor how much was sold at Kah-Nee-Ta before police caught up with Miller.

This was just the beginning of a busy weekend for tribal police, who were called out for a lost hunter, a stabbing and the theft of a tribal garbage truck. — At 4:30 a.m. Sunday October 29, Prunie Williams called Montee at home after range riders had spent all night in the Camas Prairie area looking for her son Bill Katchia, who was separated from his stepfather Silas Williams on the previous afternoon. Silas had returned to his pick-up after a day of elk hunting and waited for Bill for several hours, finally leaving the woods at 8:00 p.m. and returning home. Prunie notified the natural resource department and range riders began the search for Bill at 9:30.

During the night Bill was caught in a blizzard and kept warm with fir boughs and a fire. When Montee was alerted shortly before daybreak, Jefferson County Search and Rescue, who did not arrive on the scene until close to noon. By that time, Bill had stumbled onto a road and a range rider picked him up, reuniting him with his worried family.

Montee's comment was, "This sure points out the need for our own search and rescue

outfit."

— At 6:00 p.m. that day, Henry Martin Kalama III (M'taat) was rushed to the clinic by Albert Squally, who found him lying by the side of Creek Road, the victim of a stabbing accident. The 18-year old, who was admitted to Mountain View Hospital and has since been released, said that he had been picked up hitchhiking by two Mexican men with whom he had had a previous altercation. When they let him out near his house, one man got out of the car after him and stabbed him, he told police.

The FBI is investigating the case and local police have been advised to look for a late model green Chevrolet with four doors.

— Early the next morning, Monday October 30, tribal employees reporting to work at the utilities shop discovered that the smaller of the two garbage trucks was missing. Air and ground reconnaissance have failed to turn up the vehicle and surrounding counties have been notified. It is not known whether the truck contained any cargo.

— Polygraphs are being administered to witnesses of the tribal apartment fire that took the life of Edgar Yahtin September 23. Tribal police and the FBI have no new leads in the suspected arson.
