Kah-Nee-Ta Lodge Tan-Ru Now Appearing

One of Portland's most unique bands, Tan-Ru, which was organized in 1976, and has since proven itself one of Portland's most unusual bands.

The band consists of Joe Waldrich who plays the drum's and is the leader of the band. Joe has played steadily in the lounge and club circuit around the Portland area since he was 17. In addition, he has studied with drummer Mel Brown, toured with a few well known bands extending from Canada to California.

Cher Doering plays guitar

and does the bands vocal arrangements. She has mastered the vocal styles of rock, country, blues, jazz and bluegrass. Cher has toured the Eastern United States with a nationally recognized band.

Mike Roser, bass player and vocalist, is a native of Arizona. In the early 60's Mike moved with his family to England where the musical influence of "the Beatles" left a permanent impression.

Community Plan Meeting Set (Monday May 14)

A public meeting is scheduled for May 14 at 7 p.m. in the Agency Longhouse. The purpose of the meeting is to review the proposed updated Warm Springs Community Plan. The plan provides guidelines for the future development within the Warm Springs Community Planning Area.

Previous meetings have drawn attention to a variety of community needs including expanded recreational and housing opportunities. More input is needed from residents and land-owners to make sure community goals and needs are valid and realistic.

General community goals and needs are broken down into Development Objectives within the following land use categories:

- A. Residential (includes single family and multi-family housing)
 - B. Commercial (includes shopping center)
 - C. Industrial (Includes Industrial Park and Mill)
 - D. Transportation (Includes vehicular and non-vehicular)
 - E. Agricultural (Includes irrigation projects)
 - F. Public Facilities (Includes cultural, religious, government, recreation, education, health, utilities)
 - G. Open Space (Includes parks and parkways)
- Development needs and objectives are then prioritized and scheduled within the Capital Improvement Plan and coordinated with the Overall Economic Development Program.

 Continued Housing and Sub-Division Development
 Deschutes Domestic Water System
 Criminal Justice Center
 Community Learning Center
 Rural Fire Protection
 Tenino Irrigation Project

 Department adequate restrictions on ocean fishing to assure returns to the Columbia to meet the allocations for Indian and non-Indian fishermen on the river.

They further complain that John Donaldson and Gordon Sandison, Oregon and Washington state fish directors, respectively, failed to recommend adequate restrictions. Donaldson and Sandison are voting members on the council.

Even though ocean fishing has been reduced for 1979, the "very best" possible result is a limited fishery in the Columbia for chinook this fall, the suit

contends.

An Indian commercial harvest of only 55,000 fall chinook in 1977 "resulted in severe economic hardships to Indian fishermen," the tribes stated.

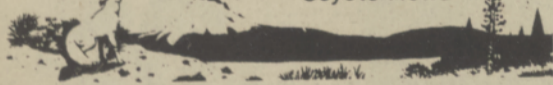
An affidavit of Jean Edwards, a biologist for the tribes, says that a low count of only 763 two-year-old chinook past Bonneville this year points to a poor spring run in 1980.

Indians have not had a commercial fishery on spring chinook the last two years, and the 1979 final count may be a record low, according to the suit.
