Leland Tom claims bareback championship

The All-Indian rodeo held at Fallon, Nevada on July 20, 21, 22 sanctioned by the Western States Indian Rodeo Association drew one of their record crowds of entries which included nine from Warm Springs.

Leland Tom brought home the championship title in the bareback riding as he managed to score a total of 72 points to top the field. The scores were very close, separating the contestants by just one and two points for the top six cowboys.

Ted Hurtado, who made his home here in the past, won the bull riding. Topping a good field of top bull riders, he scored a total of 76 points in that event.

Another local boy Lee Tom managed to get fifth in saddle bronc. The saddle bronc was loaded with top-notch cowboys from the Northwest and Canada.

Another familiar name around Warm Springs was

Dave Best, who placed second in the saddle bronc, and split 2nd-3rd in the bull riding. Other riders, ropers and barrel racers were unable to place.

Other locals who made the long journey are as follows: Marita Johnson who was one of the top barrel racing contenders all season long just a year ago. At the present time she is sitting fairly high but failed to place at Fallon. Other local entries were: in the barrel Priscilla, Sammi and Carmel Squiemphen, and Carmela Scott, and in saddle bronc Terry Squiemphen. Danny Scott in the roping events. The lone roper was Danny Scott but he failed to place in his specialty.

All-Around title went to Fred Kinnerson for his total winnings of \$814.38.

Bikers test talents

Heat rose from the blacktop, dizzying the already wobbly bicyclists and fizzling the enthusiasm of the youthful judges. But while the Cadet Program's bike rodeo July 18 was more subdued than expected, the 108 degree temperature did not discourage a couple of dozen bike riders from testing their talents on two wheels.

Three kids came away with trophies but most of the 23 entrants were humbled by the series of spirals, figures 8's and cones that had to be navigated in the community center parking lot. The rodeo was designed to test bike riders' maneuvering skills as well as teach them basic rules of the road.

"A lot of kids though they knew more than they did," commented juvenile officer Rick Souers. "They need work on hand signals," he added.

A possible 80 points could be accumulated on the courses, marked out with lime on the hot asphalt. Eight year old Rachel Macy earned the most points, 69, and won in the eight-and-under group. Jason Anstette, 10, took the 9-12 category with his 64. And Lonnie Wainanwit, 13, gathered 62 points to win in the 13-16 group.

There are no plans to follow up the rodeo with other safety activities, but Souers noted that bicycle safety manuals are available free at the police department.
