Final adoption list ready for November 15 election

Twenty-three names will appear on the ballot November 15 for membership approval of adoption into the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs. All the individuals listed on the ballot have been approved by the Tribal Council as eligible for adoption into the Tribes.

The next issue of **Spilyay Tymoo**, which comes out on November 2, will carry photographs and brief background sketches of the adoption hopefuls. To those listed or to the families of those listed, please contact the **Spilyay Tymoo** office and arrange a time for the photo to be taken. We will be running a two-page spread similar to the one we did for the 1977 adoption referendum.

As required by the tribal Constitution, 50% of the eligible tribal voters must cast their ballots November 15 for the election to be valid. Tribal members 21 and older or married are eligible to vote.

Council adds housing to Nov.15 referendum

The most ambitious housing proposal ever to be brought before the membership has been approved by the Tribal Council and will appear on the referendum ballot November 15.

Voters will be asked to okay a \$6.6 million package which includes the following projects:

- 30 additional two-bedroom apartments
- 10 additional two-bedroom duplexes
- 10 additional duplex sites
- 10 four-bedroom family homes
- 10 three-bedroom family homes.

—6 additional Agency homesites

—8 Simnasho Senior Citizen homes

—5 Simnasho rental home relocations

—10 additional Simnasho homesites

—20 additional Dry Creek homesites

A 24-bed dorm for Kah-Nee-Ta had been presented to the Council as part of the package, but it was removed from the list of projects because the Council felt that people do not approve of the concept. Vice-chairman Delbert Frank, Sr. said that, for the sake of propriety, the dorm rooms were not separate enough.

Parks and playground areas for the Tenino project were also held aside, with the idea that they could be planned for but completed later. Roads will also be done in phases which will result in a savings of \$305,000 in 1980. The oil and top two inches of rock will not be done until 1981.

Although a date has not yet been set for a General Council meeting, Council says they will schedule one for the first part of November. Planner Mike Clements noted that the input of the younger voters will be important at the General Council meeting. He referred

to the results of the housing survey for those in the 19-25 year age group, and that this group had indicated a strong desire for more rental-type housing and apartments which could be shared. His point was that Indians have been taught that the young don't speak up at the longhouse and that they should, in this case, be encouraged to speak for themselves.

The following briefly summarizes the housing and subdivision projects:

Tenino Apartments Phase II

This proposed housing project is geared toward the housing needs of young tribal members in their twenties and younger. A recent Housing Survey of 19-25 year olds revealed the lack of rental housing for this age group of tribal members.

The housing project involves the following:

- 30 Two-bedroom Town-house Apartments
- 10 Two-bedroom Duplexes (20 Units)
- 10 Additional Building Sites for Duplexes

The project is proposed to be located southwest of the existing Tenino Apartments, on the east side of Tenino Creek. Access to the project would be provided from the

existing road which now serves the Tenino Apartments. The project would be served by public water and sewer systems.

Greeley Heights Subdivision Phase II

This proposed project is designed for tribal families in need of detached single family homes. The homes would be available to tribal members for purchase, lease option or rent. Leases would be provided on the vacant lots to members in the process of financing

individual homes or for tribal housing. Landscaping and fencing would be the responsibility of individual homeowners. Each homesite will include a lot area of approximately two acres.

The housing project involves the following:

- 10 Four-bedroom Homes
- 10 Three-bedroom homes
- 6 Additional Building Sites for Homes

Evaline had never dreamed that she would ever eat a meal costing \$500. On the menu was salmon, fresh spinach mold, carrots, dilled cucumbers, potato patties, tomatoes with mushrooms and shrimp salad. Quite a feast and of course all proceeds went to the re-elect Carter/Mondale campaign fund.
