program goals and objectives are:

1.0 Title I Reading Program will screen and identify educationally deprived children as having the greatest need for special assistance.

1.1 The student selection worksheet will be updated monthly with a copy sent to the Federal Program Coordinator at the end of each month.

2.0 For each student identified, an appropriate educational plan will be developed and implemented.

2.1 Each student served will have at least one written learning objective identified on the student objective summary sheet, monitored and reported monthly to Keith Johnson.

3.0 Promote teacher awareness and understanding on

student/Title I progress and achievement.

3.1 Communicate student progress and achievement monthly to each teacher of a Title I child.

4.0 Increase and maintain program communication between school and home.

4.1 Each Title I staff member (Title I teachers and Aides) will make at least one parent contact a month to review student progress and achievement.

The program goals have been suggested through and approved FY1980 Program Proposal, and the program objectives are the result of the Warm Springs Educational Needs Assessment and the survey information gathered during 1979 evaluation of programs.
