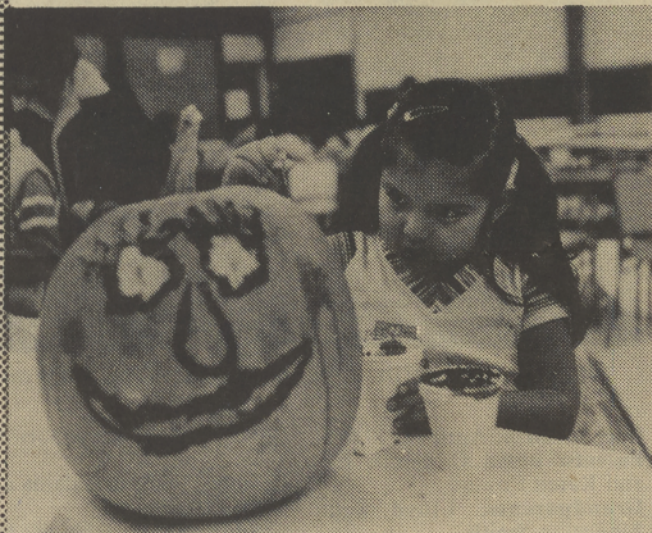

From the Law and Order Committee

TRUANCY:All Juveniles shall be required to attend school through the completion of the twelfth grade. It shall be unlawful for any juvenile who has not completed the twelfth grade to be absent from school on any school day unless he or she has been excused from attendance for that day by the school authorities.

Ordinance 50 Penalties Section. Regarding the Big Game Ordinance, the reason hunters have to get permits is to prove to the State that we can manage the McQuinn Strip area. We need the people's cooperation and the Police cooperation. Copies of this ordinance can be picked up at the Tribal Council Office, the tags are free, but they are good only for the month they are issued. Permits help keep track of the big game and aid in protecting the resource.

(Big Game—Ordinance 50)
Article 1. Penalties

A. Persons Subject to Warm Springs Tribal Court:

Tribal members and all other Indians subject to the jurisdiction of the Warm Springs Tribal Court, found guilty of violation of any of the provisions of this Ordinance, shall be subject to fine and/or imprisonment, in accordance with Section 22, Chapter VI and section 34, of the Chapter VIII, Law and Order Code, which provides as follows:

"Any Indian who shall violate any law, rule or regulation adopted by the Tribal Council for the protection or conservation of the fish or game of the reservation, shall be deemed guilty of an offense and upon conviction thereof shall be sentenced to jail for a period

of not to exceed thirty days, or such other penalty as may be provided by Tribal Ordinance, and he shall forfeit to the court for the use of any Indian institution such game as may be found in his possession."

"Every person convicted for violation of any of the provisions of this Code for which another penalty is not provided shall on conviction thereof be punished by a fine of not more the \$50.00 or by imprisonment for not more than ten (10) days; for a second conviction within one year thereafter such person shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.00 or by imprisonment for not more than twenty (20) days or both fine and imprisonment. Upon the third or subsequent conviction within one year after the first conviction such person shall be punished by a fine of not more the \$200.00 or by imprisonment for not more than three (3) months or by both fine and imprisonment."

B. Persons Not Subject to the Warm Springs Tribal Court:

Persons other than Tribal members or other Indians subject to the jurisdiction of the Warm Springs Tribal Court, shall be punishable pursuant to the provisions of 18 United States Code, Section 1165, which provides as follows:

"Whoever, without lawful authority or permission, willfully and knowingly goes upon any land that belongs to any Indian or Indian Tribe Band or group and either are held by the United States in trust or are subject to a restriction against alienation imposed by the United State or upon any lands of the United States that are reserved for Indian use, for the purpose of hunting, trapping, or fishing thereon, or for the removal of game, peltries, or fish therefrom, shall be fined not more than \$200 or imprisoned not more than 90 days or both, and all game, fish and peltries in his possession shall be forfeited."

Cable crews busy near Kah-Nee-ta

Pacific Northwest Bell began work Tuesday, October 30 on a \$117,100 telephone cable construction job to meet future service demands around Kah-Nee-Ta resort.

PNB Manager Glenn Kennedy says company cable crews will bury nearly six miles of cable east along Kah-Nee-Ta Road from the Village to the Deschutes River. Another three-mile section will extend north from the highway just west of the village.

Kennedy says part of the job will provide additional phone facilities for several rural homesites. Another portion of the new cable construction will make more circuits available for Kah-Nee-Ta lodge.

PNB expects to complete the project in three months.
