1. Present were Rita Squiempfen, Delbert Frank, Larry Calica, Orin Johnson, Zane Jackson, Nick Kalama, Jacob Frank and Chairman Eugene Greene. (Delbert Frank and Eugene Greene left at noon recess to attend a Affiliated Tribes meeting in Spokane.)

2. Joint meeting with Yakima Tribal Council re: Celilo-Wy'am Board approved for January 17th, here in the Warm Springs Tribal Council room beginning at 10:00 a.m.

3. **Resolution No. 5633** adopted, expressing appreciation to Owen Panner for his many years of service.

4. Approval by motion of Kah-Nee-Ta Board action in hiring Garland Brunoe as resident manager of Kah-Nee-Ta and Basil Miaullis & Associates, consultants, to assist him.

5. Travel authorization requests considered:

Fish & Wildlife Committee: Phillip David to attend Columbia River Fisheries Council meeting in Portland, January 7th. Approved.

10. Progress report on the Hydroelectric Power Project by Jerry Dibble and Dennis Karnopp.

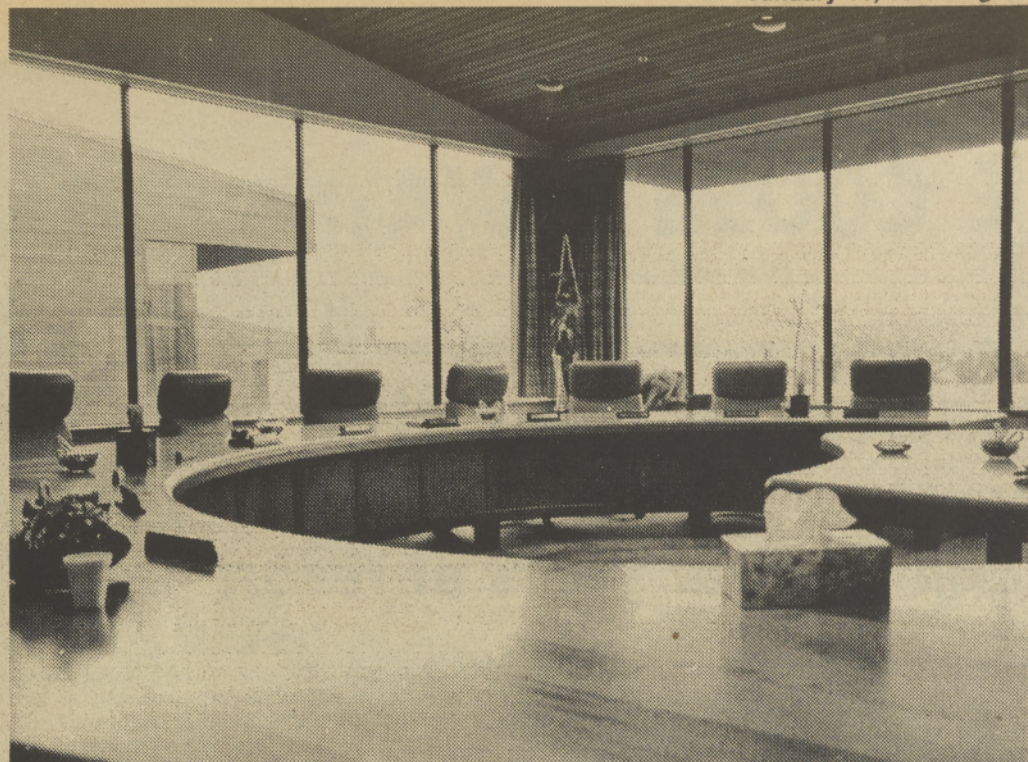
11. Travel authorization request submitted by the Law & Order committee to attend the Intertribal Fish Commission meeting in Yakima on January 11th and 12th denied.

This program will be presented by Mr. Mark Miller, who is the Director of the Drug Information Center at the University of Oregon.

Drugs are a big problem in all communities and cities throughout the world. It is our feeling, that the more each of us, in our own related field, can learn about the problems, the better we will be able to cope with them and hopefully put them to a definite end in the very near future.

The cost per person for this two-day workshop, is \$15.00. Plus a book, which is optional, that may be purchased for \$7.50.

The neglected child

To All Concerned:

On Saturday January 12, 1980 from 1 to 4 p.m., there will be an organization meeting to discuss the feasibility of the planned Child Neglect Seminar described below. All interested in attending the seminar are urged to attend this meeting.

The juvenile department of Warm Springs will be presenting a Child Neglect Seminar at the Community Center, which entails a total of 35 hours of teaching and discussion. This 35 hour class will be covered in four hour sessions, one night per week until its' completion, unless otherwise scheduled.

Sixteen courses are covered which, hopefully, will help all of us interested in the youth of our community and the world to understand the topic of child neglect and child abuse better, and thus enable us to handle

the situation when it arises and hopefully prevent some of the incidents from happening.

Some examples of the text that will be covered are briefly outlined below:

1. Introduction to Curriculum: 30 minute film-occupational focus, (working together).

2. Introduction to identification Sequence; overview on four units: physical abuse, neglect, emotional maltreatment and sexual abuse.

3. Identifying the physically abused child: physical and behavioral indicators, social, family, personal causes and precipitating factors.

4. Identifying the neglected child covers physical and behavioral indicators, trainees attitudes toward neglected children and neglectful parents, and difficulties of conclusively identifying suspected cases, and a wealth of other information.

We urge all of you to attend all sessions!

Boy Scout leader dies

Irving "Shep" Shepherd, 82, died December 24, 1979 from injuries he received in a November 28, 1979 car-pedestrian accident near his home in Salem. He was born October 9, 1897.

Shep was well known in Warm Springs for his work with the Boy Scouts and the boys dorm. He worked as a teacher/advisor and advisor at the boys dorm for 15 years.

He began his working career with the Bureau of Indian Affairs as a boys advisor in Hoopa, California in 1924. From 1927 to 1934, Shep worked in two Indian schools in South Dakota and in 1936 he worked at the Kiowa Indian Agency in Oklahoma. From 1943 to late 1946 Shep did war

work in Prince Rupert, British Columbia. After the war ended, Shep resumed his advisory work with young boys and worked at Chemawa Indian School for three years.

In 1950, then Warm Springs School principal Gail Anderson got in touch with Shep to come to work at Warm Springs. Shep came to Warm Springs in October and did not leave until he retired July 3, 1965. Shep originated the well-known Boy Scout troop here in Warm Springs and he was given the second highest national award, the Silver Antelope, for his work with the Scouts.

One brother, Allen, with whom Shep lived and one daughter, survive.
