

Powwow begins tonight

The fifth annual Lincoln's Birthday powwow starts tonight with contest dances for ages 16 and under. Grand entry will be shortly after supper, about 8:00 p.m.

The Muskwachees Juniors, from Hobbema, Alberta, Canada, will be the host drum. Other drummers invited and confirmed they were coming are: The Teton Ramblers of Pine Ridge, South Dakota; the Heart Butte Singers of Heart Butte, Montana; the Snake River Singers; and a drum from Momio Beach, Alberta,

Canada.

An honor dance in recognition and appreciation of senior citizens will be on Saturday afternoon. Not a contest dance, each senior citizen will be recognized.

Special groups will perform Saturday evening. This can include almost any group and awards will be given.

To ease crowding, bleachers will be at both ends of the longhouse and more chairs and benches will be available. "We're just going to have to

squeeze ourselves in," said Rudy Clements, who will share emceeing duties with Amos Simtustus.

Powwow hostesses Lucinda Heath, Lucille Gilbert, Carroll Johnson, and Sheila Wahnetah, are still selling raffle tickets for \$1.00. Major items to be raffled off include a beaded bag, microwave oven, buckskin vest, and a sand painting clock.

Supper will be served Friday evening and breakfast, lunch, and supper will be served Saturday and Sunday. Sunday will be for Washat services.

4. Culture/Heritage committee charter (procedures/guidelines as to their duties and responsibilities) approved as presented.
5. Harold Culpus, Fish & Wildlife committee, approved to attend the Columbia River Fisheries Council hearing on S. 2163, February 11-13, Seattle; and their regular meeting in Portland, February 14.
6. Alvin Smith Sr., chairman of Land Use/Planning committee, presented their annual report. Also reported on the suggested cemetery fence line for Simnasho; no action needed until late March.
7. Tribal Council minutes for July, August, September, October, November, and December approved for distribution.
8. Wilbur Johnson, Fish & Wildlife committee, approved to attend North Pacific Fisheries Council in Anchorage, Feb. 6-8, with the request a report be submitted to Council the week following his return. Expenses to be reimbursed by Intertribal Fish Commission.
9. Eugene Greene, chairman of tribal council, approved to attend the Commission on

10. Use of Agency Longhouse kitchen and dining area by Incentive Program approved for February 8; for fund-raising chili feed.

11. Amos Simtustus and Jacob Frank, Celilo-Wy'am Board members, approved to attend Commission on Indian Services meeting, February 8, Chemawa; and Larry Calica as a tribal council representative. Travel by tribal council wagon.
