

PNB sponsoring photo contest

The most widely read publication in Oregon is seeking a photograph for its cover.

Pacific Northwest Bell, for the second year, is inviting Oregon residents to submit entries for its telephone directory cover photo competition, according to PNB manager Glenn Kennedy.

June 16 is the deadline for entering the contest which will provide the winner with \$1500 in prize money and the honor of having his or her photo, with appropriate credit, appear on the cover of the company's directories to be published in Oregon during 1980-1981. Winners will be announced August 22, 1980.

Entry forms, with complete explanations of how to enter and on what basis the photos will be judged, have been sent to PNB Phone Center stores and commercial photo supply stores throughout Oregon.

The competition is open to anyone who lives or works in PNB territory. This year the contest also is open to PNB

employees.

PNB reminds entrants to send duplicates of entries, not originals, for initial judging. Twenty-five semifinalists will be chosen and original negatives or transparencies will be requested for the final screening process.

A three-judge panel of experts will choose from ten

finalists following the screening process to eliminate photos not suitable for reproduction on directory covers because of technical considerations.

The Northwest Indian Youth Conference to be held at Kah-Nee-Ta Lodge May 1, 2, 3, has the theme entitled "Strengthening Self Image and Leadership."

Any student from Madras High School and selected junior high students may attend the conference, but one must consider attendance and grades. Those students wishing to attend must sign up and pay the \$10.00 pre-registration fee in Mr. Pinkham's office.

Since students will be attending Thursday and Friday during school hours, your

absence will not count toward the 15 day absentee policy. Attendance at the conference will be considered a student activity.

The Miss Northwest Indian Youth pageant and Talent Show will be held May 1 in the high school gym at 7:30 p.m. A powwow open to the public will be on May 2 at the Agency Longhouse beginning at 8:00 p.m. The general public is welcomed to attend both activities with no admission charge. You're welcomed to participate at the powwow Friday evening with dancing and drumming.

Indian high school students who are hosts and hostesses

have been requested to dress up according to traditional dress for Wednesday evening at Kah-Nee-Ta, pageant and talent show, and banquet.

Housing of guests by Indian students is another concern. More housing sign-ups are needed, so please sign up with Mr. Pinkham. Everyone should meet their guests at the Community Center Wednesday evening or Thursday at Kah-Nee-Ta. Rules of keeping guests are: no drinking; transport guests students to and from conference sites; be courteous and helpful; and return guest to Community Center on specified time Saturday.

"Strengthening Self Image and Leadership"

The Fifth Annual Northwest Indian Youth Leadership Conference will be held at Kah-Nee-Ta Lodge May 1, 2, 3. This year's conference will be sponsored by the Madras High School Indian Club, School District 509-J, and the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs.

"Strengthening Self Image and Leadership" has been chosen as the theme of the conference.

Registration will be held at the upper lobby of the Lodge April 30 from 7:00-9:00 p.m. and also May 1 from 8:00-10:00 a.m. Registration fee is \$15.

About 300 pre-registration forms have already been returned, according to Ron Pinkham, high school Title IV-A counselor, and he expects more to register at the door.

Pinkham stresses that this conference is for the youth,

explaining that if a conference is run like it's designed for adults, it will be boring for the students.

Pinkham also noted that at the Oregon Indian Education Conference in Portland April 9, 10, 11, some student concerns were: teachers lack cultural uniqueness; reaction or lack of verbal participation misinterpreted by teachers; grading system unequal; need curriculum developed at high school; misconceptions about Indians (stereotypes) reinforced in class; school policies concerning school behavior and attendance and other matters appear to be against Indian students; racism in classroom between non-Indian students exists; lack of parental involvement.

The community is encouraged to attend and take part in the May 2 powwow be began at 8:00 p.m. at the Agency Longhouse. This will be non-competitive.

Other activities include a Talent Show and Miss NWIY pageant to be held at the Madras High School May 1, starting at 7:30 p.m. The talent show and pageant are
