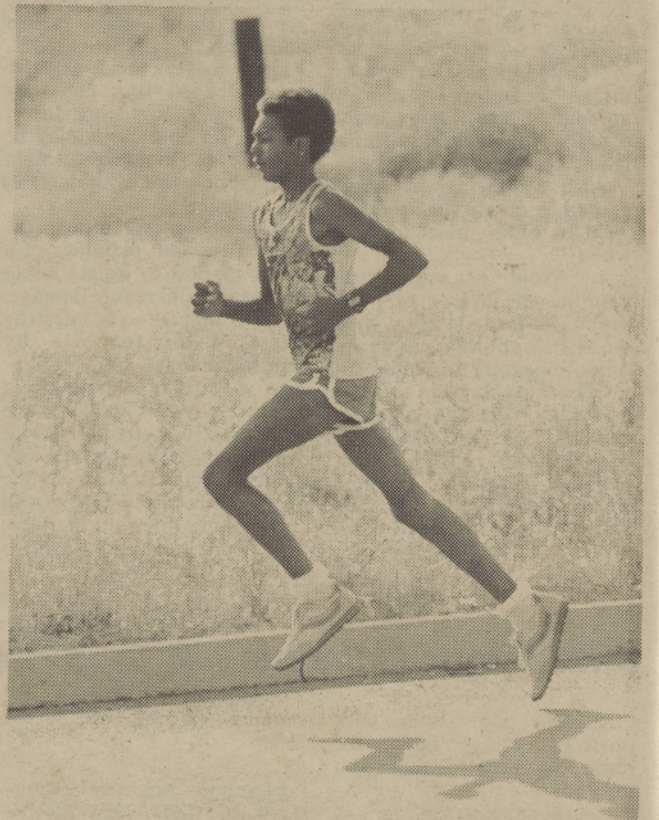

## Warm Springs rodeo July 4-5

The Warm Springs Indian Rodeo has been set for July 4-5 and will start 1:00 p.m. daily. Sanctioned by the Western States Indian Rodeo Association, events include calf

roping, bareback bronc riding, team roping, saddle bronc riding, bull riding, wild cow milking, barrel racing and the wild horse race.

First place winners of each even except for the wild horse race, will receive champion belt buckles. A buckle will also go to the all-around cowboy.

A \$200 purse is added in each event. \$50 will be given to the daily winner of the wild horse race.

Slack time will be held after Friday's performance. Vic Woods will furnish the bulls and horses will be off the reservation.

## 13 Kilometer run-July 5

The third annual Ki-utus Jim 13 Kilometer Run is scheduled to go off at 8:00 a.m. at the White Swan Pavilion, July 5.

The run is being held during the White Swan 10-Day Powwow and encampment.

Teams expected to come are

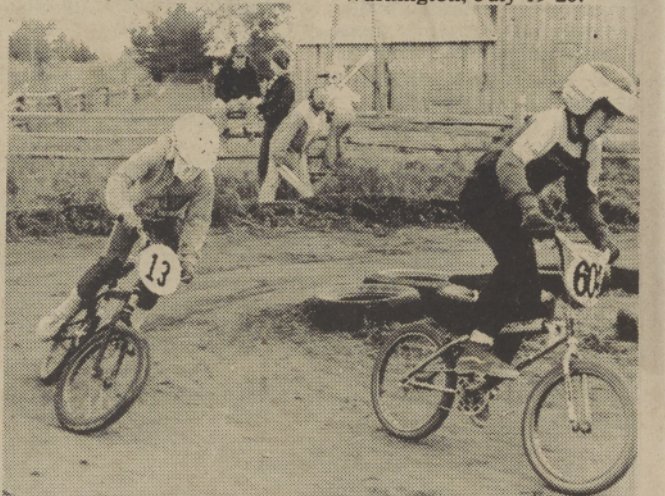
Lummi, Taholah, Nisqually, Yakima, Pendleton, Queets, LaPush and other Washington teams.
