The IHS clinic personnel urge those who will need school and sports physicals to make their appointments now. The earlier you get your physical taken care of, the better, says Health Educator Lee Loomis.

"Come September, there is a deluge of kids coming in for

their physicals, and we get overwhelmed here," Loomis explained. He said that if people would come in early (this month), there are three doctors on hand and all the facilities necessary to do the physicals.

"It's a hassle if you wait until

September," he stressed. Loomis added that students don't have to have the forms to get their physicals done. "The clinic keeps all the data on file, so when the form comes we can just fill it out and send it to the proper place," Loomis concluded.

## Danzuka handed five-year term

Luther Danzuka, 24, was sentenced to five years in the Oregon State Penitentiary July 23 by Judge George W. Neilson, pro tem, for assault in the third degree.

He pleaded guilty to the charge of shooting Teresa Suppah, 19, in the thigh at the Pelton Reregulating Dam April 9. The incident occurred in the afternoon at "Tom Dooley Point" on the knoll above the reregulating dam, according to investigating

officer Harry Brizee of the Jefferson County Sheriff's office. He referred to the site as "a local hangout and party place."

Brizee said that Danzuka was intoxicated and started shooting at the girls who were with him. Danzuka was at the top of the knoll by the car, and the girls were still down below. He shot at and missed Rachael Winishut, but he shot again and hit Teresa in the inner, upper thigh," Brizee explained.

He added that Suppah was very lucky that the bullet didn't hit her in the femoral artery.

Warm Springs police and the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department both responded to the call. Warm Springs police took Danzuka into custody at the knoll while the Sheriff's officers and ambulance crew brought the wounded girl up from the bottom. She was taken by Madras ambulance to St. Charles Medical Center in Bend.
