

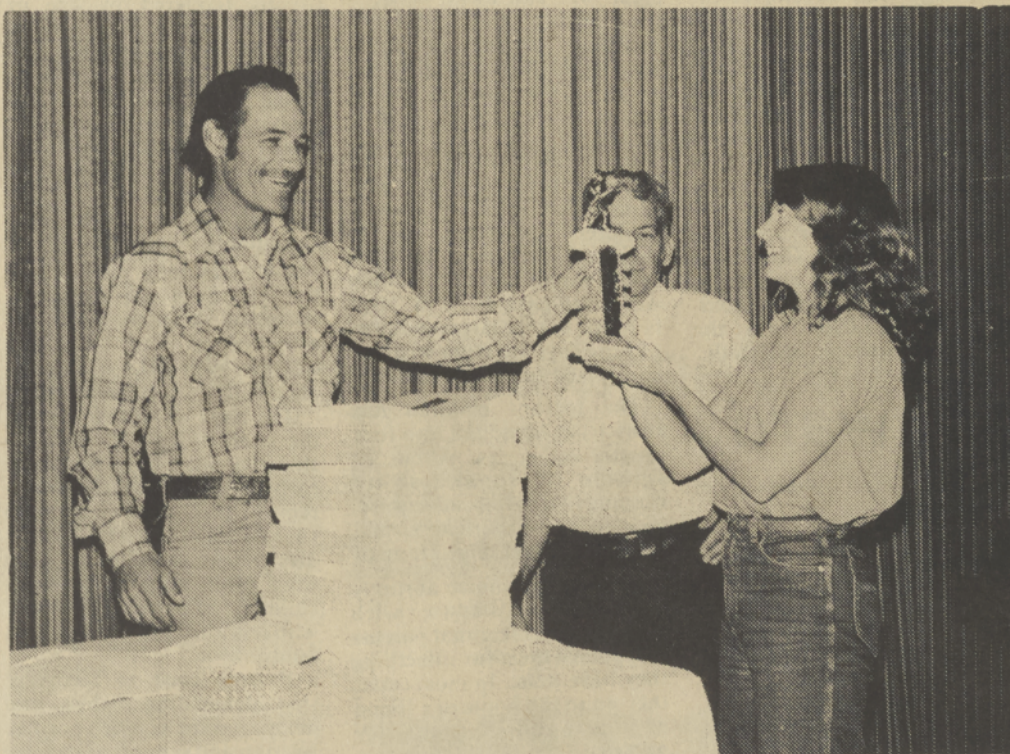

509-J announces free and reduced lunches

To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application form contains a statement above the space for signature, certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable state and federal criminal statutes.

In certain cases foster

children are also eligible for these benefits. If families have foster children living with them and wish to apply for such meals and milk for them, they should contact the school.

Under the provisions of the policy, the Building Principal will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make an request either orally or in writing to the hearing official, Dr. Ernest Weber, 1335 Buff Street,

Madras, Oregon, 475-6192, for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should file a new application. Such changes may affect the eligibility of the children.

In the administration of school food service programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color or national origin.

Each school and the office of the superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.
