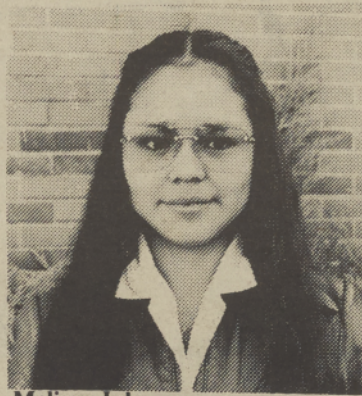
Senior and Junior queen candidates

Accident claims life

Joan Williams, 44, died in a one-car accident December 8 when her car left the road and rolled. She was thrown from the car which crashed on Kah-Nee-Ta Road at approximately 10:30 p.m. about four and a half miles north of Warm Springs.

Three other occupants of the car were injured. Jack Williams, 27, Robert Bruce, 16, and Louisa Suarez were all

found lying near the car when emergency medical personnel arrived. The three injured were taken to Mt. View Hospital where Robert Bruce was treated and released. Louisa Suarez was transported to St. Charles Hospital in Bend for further treatment.

The accident is under investigation by BIA Special Investigator Mark Werner since a fatality was involved.

Tenino wreck injures three

Three 18 year-old tribal members were injured in a one-car accident on Tenino Road Sunday, December 7, at 6:10 a.m. Injured were Trudee Clements, Forrest "Fox" Leonard and Radine Johnson. The accident happened about one-quarter mile from the Ed Manion residence.

According to the police report the 1979 Datsun, driven by Leonard, was going too fast, skidded 405 feet and apparently hit a tree. The whole front end was "wiped out", according to a police spokesperson.

Most seriously injured was Trudee Clements. She was

trapped in the auto with possible neck and back injuries, according to Fire and Safety personnel. She is still hospitalized in Bend and is being treated for a sprained back.

"It took us 30 to 40 minutes to get her out," said EMT Danny Martinez. "I think we did a hell of a good job, taking our time" in order not to make her injury worse. "Our training paid off," Martinez said that after evaluating the situation, rather than just pulling her from the wreckage they strapped her to a short backboard, applied a cervical

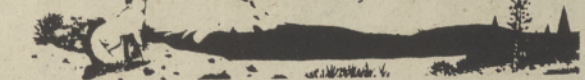
collar (for her neck), and gently slid her out.

Radine Johnson had severe lacerations on her knee cap and Fox was reported to be experiencing labored breathing. All were dazed and, according to the EMTs, none of the victims could count backwards from 10. "We ask them to do that to determine their level of consciousness," Martinez explained. That also helps the emergency team evaluate other possible injuries.

According to the Fire and Safety incident report, alcohol was the suspected cause of the accident.
