### Registration papers sought

Words come to us in many strange ways. Accents change along with meanings because of use. Here are a few theories on the origin of some words.

**Buffalo** is a misnomer when applied to the American bison. The word comes from Portuguese (bufalo) can be traced to the Latin bufalus (wild ox.)
