

Girls lose in volleyball playoff

The Madras High School volleyball team came back from the Round Robin League on November 7 tied with Vale for second place in the district. They met again on Tuesday, November 10, in neutral John Day to determine who would place second in the 7-AA Greater Oregon League. Madras was defeated.

Madras completed the season prior to the tie-breaking game on an equal status with Vale. Both had a 5 and 3 score. Madras had two losses to Burns and one to Vale.

The best two out of three games at John Day determined the winner in the playoff.

Madras defeated Vale 15-9 in the first game and then lost to them in the following games, 9-15 and 7-15.

Coach Margaret Sturza said the team felt "a mental let-down. Concentration was lacking and we let up at the end of the second game." She went on to explain what happened. "We gave them five free balls. In the third game they just blew us out."

But on the whole Sturza says, "I think we had a very successful season. We had a neat team to work with."

Following the game at John Day all the district coaches conferred to select the all-league team. Four girls from Madras High were counted as outstanding players in the 7-AA league. Karen Linder was named to the first team all-league. Anita Bryant was named to the second team all-league. Vesta Johnson and Kristen Powell received honorable mentions.

Swim survival lessons available for babies

Worried about your young child when he or she is near the water? Lessons in swim survival training might help quell those fears.

Swimming instructor Jackie Young from Portland is offering Swim Survival training to babies and toddlers in a series of four lessons at the Kah-Nee-Ta Village swimming pool.

Jackie Young brought her swim babies from Portland earlier in the year to demonstrate swim survival training. Several local mothers and children participated in the show held at Kah-Nee-Ta Lodge.

The first session of training has already begun. Other sessions will be arranged if interest is expressed, says Young. Kathleen Moses at the Warm Springs Health Center or Tony Suppah of Warm Springs will help to arrange the lessons.

A statement of Jackie Young's policy is included in a packet presented to parents of youngsters taking the swim survival training. Part of it reads, "It is my desire to

provide your child with the maximum individual attention that is needed for his/her progress. I am interested in your child's progress as an individual and not in relation to what other children may or may not be doing. I am interested in his health and his developmental patterns and behavior.

In most cases, this will be one of the first major learning experiences for your child outside of the home. Progress and success is largely dependent on the cooperation and understanding of the parent and teacher and is of maximum importance to me."

Four lessons paid in advance is \$28. There is no pool charge. However, any others wishing admission to the pool must pay the regular admission fee.

Lessons are arranged by the week due to weather conditions. Young must drive from Portland to conduct the classes.

She hopes to include some of the young members of Warm Springs in a performance to be

staged in Portland on May 1, 1982. The show will be called "It's a small world, after all."

Young hopes to have children from different areas of the nation as well as different

nationalities participating. She looks forward to having some Indian children as performers.
