Trudee Clements, 1981 Miss Warm Springs and Miss NCAI 1st runner-up, will be at the convention to make her bid for princess of N.A.I.C.A.

The convention is scheduled so as to occur during the Indian National Finals Rodeo, also being held in Albuquerque.

The site for the Indian Cattlemen's convention is the Midtown Holiday Inn. The convention activities will begin with registration at 8:00 a.m. on Friday, November 20 and end at noon on Saturday, November 21.

an interpreter, which sometimes made it difficult to catch the intention of his speech.

The Tuesday afternoon session adjourned early, and the Warm Springs delegation looked forward to their dinner that evening with Ken Smith, his wife Jeannie, and some of Smith's office staff.

Captain Cook's Hotel, which is an older, dignified hotel in Anchorage, was the perfect choice for dinner. Marble floors, solid wood pilars, and even a glass case containing a 2,000 pound stuffed polar bear graced the lobby.

The delegation enjoyed talking with Smith, his wife and staff. Great support and respect for Smith was obvious.

Day Three

There were no general sessions held on Wednesday, so much of the Warm Springs group toured Anchorage. Being bussed through housing developments, (nearly every house had a price tag of \$180,000 or more), Earthquake Park, (where, in 1964, entire buildings were swallowed by the shifting earth), and visiting the downtown core of Anchorage made most of us feel fortunate to live in the "lower 48."

But an historically enlightening part of the tour was the visit to the Anchorage Museum. We strolled through a tent that had been part of "Tent City" (the first established housing in Anchorage prior to 1915). We saw beautiful paintings done by local artists and also a replica of Russian housing that once existed in Alaska. There were displays of beaded items, sculptures, and a copy of the newspaper that proclaimed Alaska's admission to the United States.

Wednesday evening was highlighted by the Miss NCAI talent show. Miss Warm Springs, Trudee Clements, along with 21 other Miss NCAI candidates worked rigorously throughout the first days of the convention for the talent competition. The 22 contestants had T.V. interviews, meetings with the NCAI executive Director and president, luncheons, breakfasts and personal interviews with the numerous judges.

Trudee performed her "Be Yourself" routine for the contest. Dressed in a mismatched get-up, obviously acquired at a local thrift shop, Trudee told the audience that it's important to be yourself and not "put on" to impress anyone. The performance won Trudee the first runner-up spot in the contest, coming in second to Mary Kay Titla from San Carlos, Arizona.

Day Four

Thursday, the convention-goers hear the final reports of the rules and credentials committee. eighty-two tribes of the total NCAI tribal membership were present for the convention, 16 were absent. There was also the nomination

and election of the new NCAI officers.

The nominations and elections were a tortuously slow process which had NCAI officials frustrated. After three hours of deliberation, Joe De La Cruz of Quinalt was elected NCAI president over Alaskan candidate Don Wright. De La Cruz who has been Quinalt tribal chairman since 1970, received 10,320 votes compared to Wright's 6,090. On the first ballot, De La Cruz received 2,000 votes more than Wright, but according to the NCAI by-laws, the majority of votes is required to win an election.

Ralph Eluska, an Aleut from Anchorage, was elected vice-president and Ella Mae Horse of the Cherokee Nation in Oklahoma was reelected as recording secretary. The treasurer position was decided by the Executive committee.

Hollis D. Stabler, Jr. was selected as treasurer. Each of the positions is a two-year term.

Day Five

The final day of convention dealt with NCAI major position papers. Resolutions dealing with alcoholism and drug abuse, economic development, education, health, housing, human resources, Indian preference, natural resources and litigation/trust responsibility were presented, debated and voted on. Resolutions were developed in the issue committee meetings held throughout the convention.

The 38th annual NCAI convention was adjourned Friday afternoon. People bid a fond farewell to the land of the midnight sun, friends and new acquaintances. Next year's convention will be held in Bismark, North Dakota.
