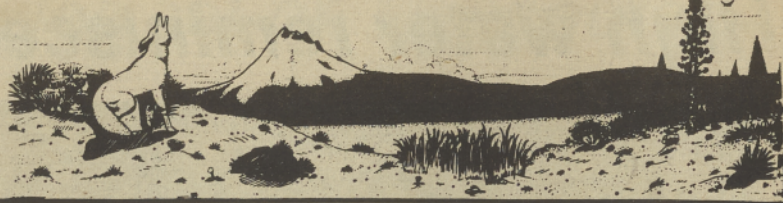

I live in a trailer court out in the country and I enjoy living out there. I'm always writing letters to people. I like to write letters often. I enjoy music. I like to play soccer, tennis, go swimming, ride a bike. What kinds of things do you like to do? I'm very busy between Monday & Friday.
