SS earning reports due April 15

People who received at least one Social Security check in 1981 and who earned more than the annual exempt amount last year have until April 15 to file an annual report of their 1981 earnings, said Kay Young, Social Security manager in Bend.

The 1981 annual exempt amount was \$5,500 for people 65 or over and \$4,080 for people under 65 all of 1981. A person who was 72 or older all of 1981 does not have to make a report. Neither do people who receive benefits because of disability, since different rules apply.

A person who did not receive any checks in 1981 because of expected earnings does not have to make a report of his or her earnings. But, Young said, if those earnings were less than expected, it would be in that

person's best interest to make a report.

People at the Bend Social Security office will answer any questions about the annual report of earnings. The Bend

Social Security office is located at 39 Louisiana. The telephone number to call to ask questions or request forms is 1-800-452-1654. It is a toll free number.

Delmar Davis of Warm Springs was killed in a car accident March 13, 1982. He was born in Redmond, Oregon on March 28, 1955.

He had been a lifetime resident of Warm Springs. He attended schools in Madras and Warm Springs, and was a 1974 graduate of Madras High School. He was active in wrestling, track and football while in high school. He also attended Mount Hood Community College where he majored in Physical Education.

He was an enrolled member of the Warm Springs Confederated Tribes and had been employed with the Tribes at the Information Center/Gift Shop since it opened in 1977. He is survived by his father

Harrison Davis, Sr. and his mother Floriene Comedown Davis, both of Warm Springs; six brothers; Darryl Davis, Dolan Waheneka, Dominic Davis, Dixon Davis, Harrison Davis, Jr., all of Warm Springs, and Dalton Davis of Goldendale, Washington.

Also surviving are two sisters, Darla Davis and Dinah Davis of Warm Springs; and his grandmother Florence Meanus of Warm Springs.

Dressing ceremonies were held at the Agency Longhouse on March 15 with Nelson Confederated Tribes officiating. Overnight ceremonies followed at the longhouse. Burial was at the Tenino Cemetery on March 16.
