

Summer activities at the Community Center

The Warm Springs Community Center has many things planned for children this summer. Please read on.

Cookie Monster Club—This is a program of arts, crafts and cookie making. It has a Sesame Street motif. The program runs from June 15 to July 20 from 2:00 p.m. to 3:15 p.m. It is limited to 12 children ages 4 to 5 year.

Act it out—4 to 5 year olds will learn one play during this session which will be performed August 5 at the summer program open house. **Act it out** will be held from July 27 to August 3 from 2:00 p.m. to 3:15 p.m. It is limited to 12 children.

Story Time—This is a quiet time for children 4 to 6 years of age. It will be held from 2:00 p.m. to 3:15 p.m., July 21 to July 28. Children will be involved in hearing stories along with arts and crafts and puppets.

Waterplay—Children will learn a variety of water play games in this program. It is limited to 14 children, 3 to 6 years of age. The dates are July 19, 20, 21, 26, 27 and 28 from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m.

Let's Pretend—This is a program of drama and is limited to 10 children ages 6 to 7 years of age. It will be held from 3:30 to 4:45 p.m., July 6, 7, 12, 13 and 14. Children will perform at the August 5 summer program open house.

Our Big Back Yard—Nature's harvest will be investigated in this nature program held from June 14 to July 12 from 2:00 p.m. to 3:15 p.m. It is limited to 12 children aged 5 to 6 years.

Mother Nature Knows Best—Arts and Crafts are utilized in this outdoor program while exploring nature. It is scheduled for 2:00 p.m. to 3:15 p.m. June 16 to July 14. This program is limited to 12 children ages 6 to 7 years.

Let's Play—Children must be accompanied by a parent, guardian or babysitter to attend this play program. It is designed for children 2 to 3 years of age and will be held from 2:00 p.m. to 3:15 p.m. July 19 to August 2.

New Games—Learning new outdoor games is the main idea behind this program. There is no limit on the number of children attending. They must be 6 years and over, however. The new games session will be held from June 21 to June 30 from 3:30 to 4:45 p.m.

Embroidery—Embroidery will be held from June 24 to July 1. The time is 3:00 to 4:45 p.m. It is limited to 12 children 4 to 6 years of age.

Papier Mache—Held from 1:30 p.m. to 2:45 p.m., June 24 to July 1. Papier Mache is limited to children ages 4 to 7 years.

Let's Paint program. It is scheduled for 3:30 to 4:15 p.m. August 2, 3 and 4. The class is limited to 12 children.

June 14—Balloon liftoff, 9:00 a.m. at the Community Center.

Can salmon properly

A botulism poisoning case reported recently at the Yakima Nation left one person in intensive care with serious physical injury. Improperly canned salmon is suspected to have been the source of the botulism poisoning.

When canning salmon it is important to use pint jars and not quart jars. Quart jars are too large to allow fish to be processed at a constant heat for the correct amount of time to kill deadly spores. Pint jars are small enough to allow heat to penetrate to the middle of the jar quickly.

A pressure canner should be used; a boiling water bath canner should not be used. Pressure canning is the only way to reach the 240 temperature required to kill spores that cause botulism. A

boiling water bath can only reach a temperature of 212. Boiling fish for long periods of time doesn't mean spores will be destroyed. Only processing fish for 100 minutes under pressure is safe.

A sealed jar doesn't mean the fish is safe if the processing method is wrong.

Botulism causing spores can live without air inside a jar and produce waste products that can kill.

Other precautions to take when canning are clean equipment and work area.

the impression that I will give up that responsibility." Smith stated that one-third of the total BIA budget is earmarked for education—totalling more than \$250 million.

Tribes across the country are concerned about the proposed BIA reorganization. Smith explained changes that have been made in the reorganization that was proposed in February. Instead of six regional offices, said Smith, there will be five, eliminating the regional office in Minneapolis and consolidating it with the central regional office in Aberdeen. Also the changes in location of the central regional office from Rapid City to Aberdeen and the southern regional office, which was proposed to be in

Oklahoma City, has been changed to Anadarko. "Our five regional service centers will be in Albuquerque, Anadarko, Aberdeen, Phoenix and Portland...we will also have small field offices in Billings, Montana and Minneapolis which will report to the Aberdeen center."

This reorganization will also "improve education services and it will also leave the director and his Washington staff free to focus their attention on the broader aspect of policy, program directions and funding."

In conclusion, Smith said, "We believe that what we have done in the way of reorganization is the best plan that could be worked out. We had to make some tough, hard decisions
