

Warm Springs profile almost complete

CHR's selling raffle tickets

Going through old photographs and choosing the best to represent the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs is the task set before members of the Culture and Heritage Committee. It is their job to select photographs for a book on Warm Springs to be published at the end of September.

Working with Rockey-Marsh, the public relations firm contracted by the Tribe and designer Rudy Milpacher, the committee is sifting through photographs stored in boxes, albums and display cases in an attempt to depict life in Warm Springs as it was and is.

The idea of compiling information in the form of a book originated in the minds of the Culture and Heritage

Committee members as a way to preserve some of the Warm Springs history and to inform people about the Warm Springs people and reservation.

The estimated cost of publishing and marketing the 80-page, 9" x 9" Warm Springs profile is \$29,715. That outlay should be returned to the Tribe by sale of the book which will be available at \$29.95 per copy. 2,250 copies of the book will be published with 250 copies constituting a special edition having the signatures of Tribal Council members and being distributed as special gifts.

Photographs of Warm Springs in days gone by are abundant but they cannot be found in only one place. With Milpacher the committee visited Macy's store, Deschutes Crossing and buildings where photographs were displayed.

Committee members went through boxes and albums containing many photographs brown with age.

The committee must select 24 photographs to use in the publication. These will be sepia toned in the book to "give it an ancient and rich look," says Bill Marsh.

Color photographs will also be incorporated into the book. Committee members are responsible for selecting photographs of artifacts from the 500 that were taken at Kah-Nee-Ta during the artifact field days held on April 8 and May 5. Forty-eight color photographs will be used.

The book is scheduled for publication at the end of September. Copies will be available for purchase shortly after that.

Adeline Miller will team with Elizabeth Jones from Umatilla to present a workshop on "Traditional Foods: Coordination with Nutrition Service."

A raffle will be held at the conference with gifts being donated by various CHR programs from the Northwest. Tickets are being sold here in

the Warm Springs community and can be purchased from CHR's Eliza Brown, Viola Govenor, Adeline Miller, Ruth Tewee and Florene Scott. The cost of each ticket is \$1 and you need not be present to win. Tickets will be on sale until August 16.
