Meeting held at Chemawa

Chemawa Indian School superintendent, Gerald Gray extends to parents of Chemawa students an invitation to attend a meeting scheduled to be held on February 1 at 10 a.m. in the school auditorium. The meeting will focus on a solid waste burning plant which has been proposed to be built in the Chemawa School area.

Representatives from the Department of Environmental Quality; Chemawa school board; the Chemawa staff and student body; Concerned Citizens of Families for a Responsible Government; Tribal Leaders of the Affiliated Tribes; and Trans Energy

Company of Oregon. Reports will be presented by interested parties.

The plant is a project of Trans Energy of Oregon. They proposed building the plant to handle 145,000 tons of garbage annually. Plans for the plant include two, 265' smokestack and a building which has been reported to be 14 stories in height.

The Chemawa school and surrounding area residents are concerned about the impact such a plant will have on the environment. They would like all concerned parties to appear for the all-day meeting to express their concerns.

Thomas was an enrolled member of the Yakima Nation. He was born in Toppenish, Washington to Leslie and Roberta Thomas on November 20, 1956. He moved to the Warm Springs area in 1963. He attended schools in Warm Springs and Madras. He enjoyed hunting and fishing. He was a member of the Wawokya tribal drumming group.

Surviving Thomas are his father Leslie Thomas of North Bend, Oregon; his mother Roberta Wahwassuck of Topeka, Kansas; his grandmother Edna Decoteau of Toppenish, Washington; his wife Illona Kalama Thomas of

Warm Springs; two daughters Roberta and Vera Thomas of Warm Springs and a son, Edwin Thomas, Jr., of Warm Springs. Four brothers, Rodney Thomas of Warm Springs, John Wahwassuck and Larry Picard of Topeka, Kansas, and Stephen Lucei of Pasco, Washington; and five sisters, Lorrie and Audrey Wahwassuck of Topeka, Pamela Thomas of Topeka, Sandy and Farrel Thomas both of Portland also survive. Numerous aunts and uncles, cousins, nieces and nephews also survive.

Dressing ceremonies were held at the Warm Springs Shaker Church on January 20 with George Williams officiating. Overnight services were held at the Shaker Church with the burial services at the Agency Cemetery January 21.
