## Reading Olympics increases skills

The 1983 March of Dimes Reading Olympics is in progress at 509-J schools. Madras High Future Business Leaders of America are directing the area's schools through this fund raising project.

The month long reading program is designed with a two-fold purpose, increasing reading ability and interest in students along with raising money for the March of Dimes for combating birth defects.

Each child selects books at his own reading level to read for his or her own pleasure.

Sponsors are signed up among family, friends and neighbors who pledge to donate an amount of money to the March of Dimes for each book the child reads. At the end of the reading period the child will collect pledges from the sponsors.

All participants will receive two certificates and an iron-on emblem. One certificate will be signed by the March of Dimes chapter in Madras and the other by National chairman Dorothy Hamill.

Children reading four to nine books will also receive a bronze

medal. Those reading 10 to 19 books will receive a silver medal and children reading 20 to 25 books will receive a gold medal.

This is the third year the Reading Olympics have been held in this district. The first year the FBLA collected \$3500. Last year young readers \$2500, enough to purchase a birthing chair for Mt. View Hospital.

Reading Olympics participants will begin collecting their money the last week in February. Assemblies will be held in March at which time awards will be presented.

Through their efforts the high school was able to continue the spring sports program, boys and girls track (1979-1982), activities banquets, band travel and equipment, boys and girls basketball. The Boosters also gave donations for wrestling lights, class floats, the

Cinderella Ball, the Future Business Leaders of America, football and wrestling.

They have sponsored the hoop shoot contest, alumni games, barbeque feeds, chili feeds, "Chomp and Stomp," Kah-Nee-Ta Night, Booster Home Coming Float, Reno Night and the Coffee Corner at the football games.
