

New program for employees

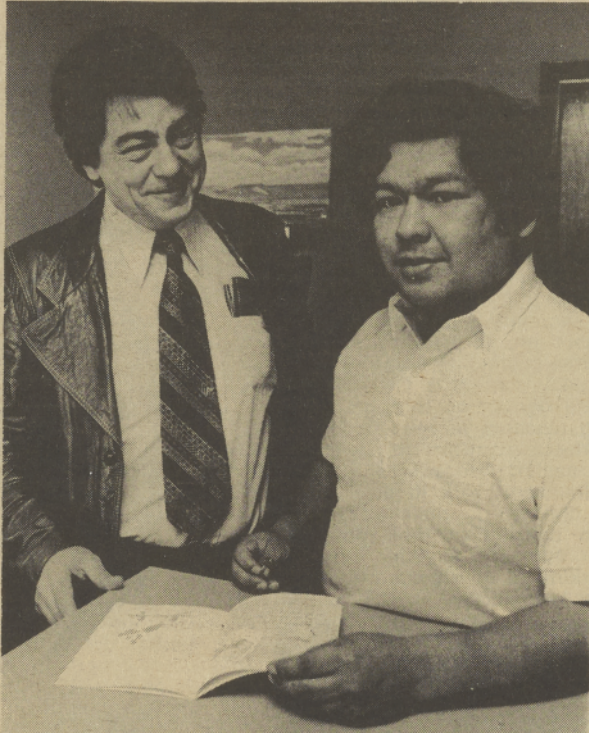
The relationship between employer and employee is sometimes difficult especially if stressful situations should enter the situation. For times like this a program exists to help ease the tension put on the working relationship.

The Troubled Employees program coordinated by Levi Bobb is designed to minimize social and mental problems and substance abuse problems in employee, employer relationships.

During periods of stress Bobb helps with counseling and organizational aspects of the Troubled Employees program. He evaluates cases and makes recommendations for treatment often acting as a liaison between the treatment program, the employee and the employer, all the while keeping the person involved in the program on the job and motivated.

Along with other duties Bobb plans and organizes education workshops for supervisors.
