Sons complete USMC training

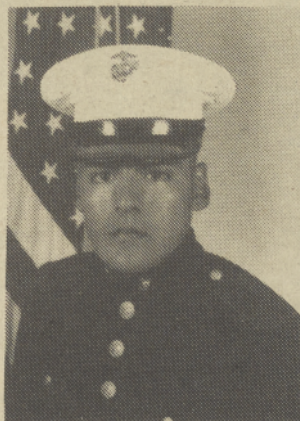

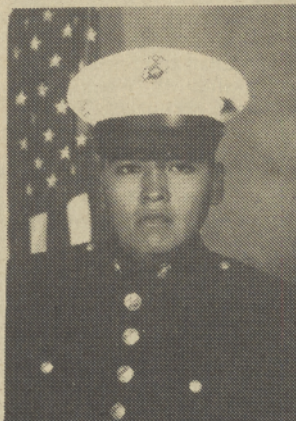
PFC William Chamema, age 20, is in his second phase of training at Camp Pendleton in San Diego, California. His contract with the Corp is for
