

Mothers—Do you need childcare?

At the Adult Learning Center, we have observed that many women are unable to work toward their G.E.D. because of lack of child care. We have been talking with the powers-that-be and have come up with a plan for an answer to that problem: a co-operative child care 'pilot project'. The parent would exchange child caring giving, for child care getting. That is, if you plan to leave your child for 4 hours per week, you also must spend 4 hours per week watching other children. We are very

fortunate because the Vern Jackson Home is being made available to us to use in the "experiment" as our child care center.

It will take a strong commitment on everyone's part to make this work. Each parent must have a back-up person ready to step in in case she is not able to work already scheduled hours. Failure to provide child care during the expected time, or failure to provide a replacement person, will result in automatic termination from the program.

If you, or someone you know, is interested and you want to try this out for the remainder of the school year, **Come to a meeting at the Vern Jackson Home on Monday, April 18 at 10:30 a.m.** (Child care will be provided). Attending this meeting is really a must if you want to be a part of getting this idea launched. We are hoping to get this started by April 25 and run til June 10.

There is still time for those interested to sign up for Central Oregon Community College adult education classes.

One of the classes offered this spring and a great success is the Indian Legal Issues class taught by tribal attorney Howie Arnett. This class is held on alternate Tuesdays. The next class will be April 19 where Arnett will explain the origins and limitations of federal and state jurisdiction in Indian country.

At the May 3 class, Arnett will discuss sources and limits of tribal jurisdiction in Indian country over Indians and non-Indians and tribal sovereignty.

At the May 17 class, Arnett will discuss the nature of reserved Indian water rights and the future of those rights.

During the final class on May 31, Arnett will explain the nature of Indian hunting and fishing rights, the regulations of on-reservation hunting and fishing and the off-reservation treaty fishing rights.

Through this class already has adequate enrollment, any interested person can still sign up for this class. Registration fee is \$10.00.

Mini course offered

There will be a "Mini Finishing Course" offered to women 17 and older on April 20 beginning at 1:30 p.m. in the EDD training room.

The finishing course will give basic instruction in the art of being attractive, poised, well-groomed and confident. The course will be the foundation

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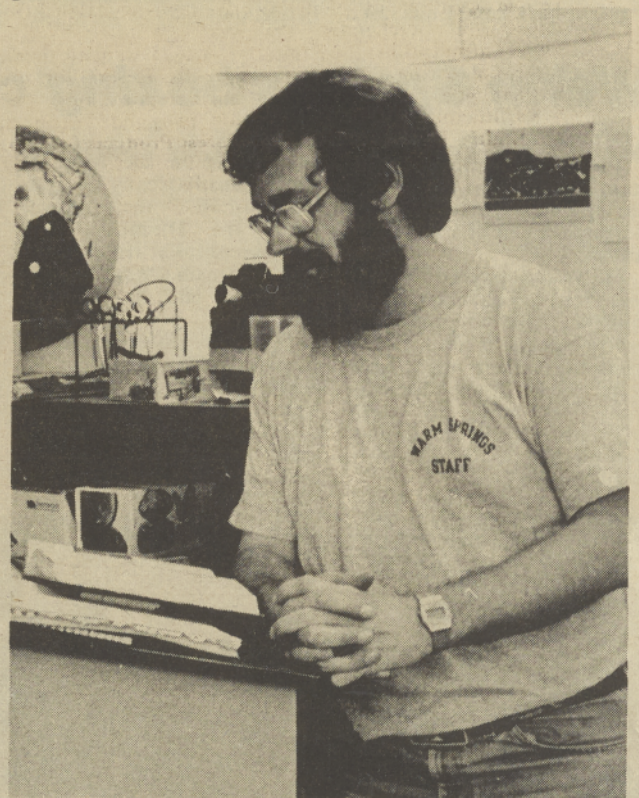
