Rafting, canoeing, kayaking, backpacking, cave exploring, orienteering and biking are planned.

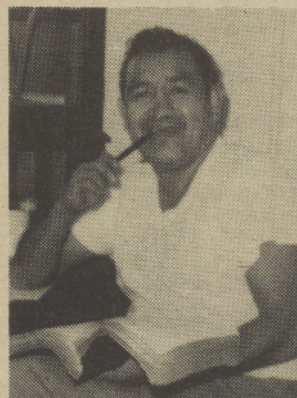
In-district students will have the first chance to sign up for the one-week sessions which will be offered at reduced rates until May 1. Warm Springs is in-district. A day camp session,

Curtis C. Stacona



Enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes, Curtis Charles Stacona, age 54 died in Yakima, Washington on March 25, 1983. Stacona, a former Warm Springs resident was living in Seattle,

Washington at the time of his death.

He was born in Warm Springs on September 15, 1928 to Charlie and Matilda Stacona. He attended the Warm Springs Boarding School and the Chemawa Indian School.

He entered the ministry in 1962 and established churches in Arizona, New Mexico, Saskatchewan, British Columbia and Oregon. He started the Full Gospel Miracle Church in Warm Springs. At the time of his death he was pastor of the Faith Outreach Temple in Wapato, Washington. Stacona was an evangelist for 20 years.

Stacona had been a member of a Golden Gloves boxing team during his younger years. He entered professional boxing and had 32 professional bouts

during his boxing career. He had boxed at the famed Madison Square Gardens in New York.

His parents preceded him in death. He is survived by his wife Aurelia of Seattle; four daughters, Charlene, Cheryl, Deborah and Marceline Stacona all of Warm Springs; five sons, William, Chris, Ronnie and Mark Stacona all of Warm Springs and Jason Stacona of Seattle; a brother Roscoe Stacona of Warm Springs; a sister Elvina Switzler of Warm Springs and nine grandchildren.

Dressing ceremonies were held at the Madras Evergreen Chapel on March 26 at 6:30 p.m. with overnight ceremonies officiated by Reverend Kenneth Bacon. Burial was at the Tenino Cemetery on March 28 at 8 a.m.

Lewis Henry, Sr.

Enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, Lewis Henry, Sr., age 60, died on March 19, 1983 at the St. Mary Hospital in Reno, Nevada. He was born in Warm Springs on March 4, 1923 to Aleck and Josephine Parker Henry who preceded him in death.

At the time of his death he was a resident of Warm Springs. He attended school in Warm Springs. He joined the Army and served during World War II, he was awarded the Bronze Star with two Oak Leaf clusters, the Euro/African/Mid East Medal, the Purple Heart Medal, Good Conduct Medal and the Victory Medal. After the service, he moved to Lyle, Washington in 1945, in

1946 he married Harriett Colwash in Toppenish, Washington. In 1947, they moved to Wamic and in 1950 to Warm Springs. He was employed by Cody Logging Co. of Tygh Valley.

He was a member of the Fort Dalles Rodeo Association, the Tywama Saddle Club of Tygh Valley, the Veteran of Foreign Wars in Warm Springs, the American Legion at Wamic, the 83rd Infantry Regiment Association and the Sportsmen's Rifle Club in Wamic.

Surviving Henry are his wife Harriett Henry of Warm Springs; three daughters, Agnes Mosqueda, Teresa and Josephine Henry all of The Dalles; three sons, Ruben Henry, Sr., and Lewis Henry,

Jr. of Warm Springs and Gilbert Henry of Toppenish, Washington; two brothers, Vernon Henry of Warm Springs and Edward Henry of White Swan, Washington; seven grandsons and three granddaughters.

Dressing ceremonies were held at the Madras Evergreen Chapel on March 21 at 2 p.m. with Ladd Kachlamet officiating. Overnight Tribal ceremonies following at the Agency Longhouse with Wilson Wewa, Jr. officiating. Burial will be at the Lower Seekseequa Cemetery on Tuesday, March 22 at 10 a.m.
