Community Center wins championship

The Warm Springs Community Center team started its long trek toward the championship first beating Lummi, Washington 98-40, then they defeated Ft. Bidwell, California 76-41. To gain a spot to play for the championship they ran past the White Swan Rockets 71-41.

During the championship game Lapwai jumped out to a 14-7 lead in the first quarter and held on through the first half and were leading 36-24 as the second quarter ended. In the third quarter Waldorf found the range and bombed the nets for 11 points to put W.S.C.C. within striking range of the high flying Nez Perce team. In the final quarter the whole W.S.C.C. team found the range and all were scoring to overcome the Nez

Perce team and go on to win the game 71-65.

Ray Waldorf made 9 field goals and he was 3 for 4 at the foul line giving him 21 points for the game. Ryan "Smitty" Smith and Anthony Davis each contributed 18 points a piece. The Bravettes were matched up with White Swan for the championship. Early in the game, the Bravettes jumped out to a commanding lead and were never threatened at any time during the game. Once again, Lana Shike had the hot hand scoring 37 points in the game as she poured in 16 field goals, one counting three points and she was four-out-of-five at the freethrow line. Tonya Mitchell contributed nine field goals and was three-for-four at the charity stripe giving her a total of 21 points for the game. Bubbi Tanewasha added 14 points with six field goals and

Tygh Valley rodeo May 21-20

The Tygh Valley All-Indian annual rodeo will be held May 21 and 22 at the Tywama Saddle Club rodeo grounds at Tygh Valley. It will be the opening show of the year for the members of the Western States Indian Rodeo Association.

This year the queen selection will be open to Indian girls from all tribes. Girls will be chosen for the court on May 20, Friday at 5 p.m. The entrants must be on horseback and in full traditional Indian regalia. The contest is open to girls who are single and between the ages of 15-18 years. A buckle will be awarded to the girl chosen as the queen.

Ten events will be featured at the rodeo. Those include 1.) saddle bronc with a \$400 purse, entry fee of \$30; 2.) bareback with a \$350 purse, entry fee of \$30; 3.) bull riding with a purse of \$350, entry fee of \$30, open to the first 32 paid entries for bull riding only; 4.) bull dogging with a purse of \$300 and entry fee of \$30; 5.) wild cow milking with a purse of \$300 and entry fee of \$30; 6.) calf roping, purse of \$300 and entry fee of \$30; 7.) team roping with a purse of \$300, entry fee \$60 per team—two loops, must enter as a team with one go-round per team; 8.) girls barrel racing with a purse of \$300 and entry fee of \$30; 9.) wild horse race with purse of \$150 a day team entry fee of \$30, first eight entries; and 10.) women's breakaway calf roping with a purse of \$150 and entry fee of

\$30. There will be no set ups or trade outs for the rodeo. Buckles will be awarded in all events. A Top Hand saddle will be given, to qualify a contestant must be entered in a timed event and a judged event.

Entries will open on May 4, 1983 and close at 8 p.m. on May 16, 1983. Mail entries to Rodeo Secretary Ginger Johnson, P.O. Box 541, Warm Springs, Oregon, 97761. Contestants must enclose their entry fee and WSIRA card number with their mail entries. Do not telegraph money to the rodeo secretary. If entry is telephoned in the contestant must have a current WSIRA card. Hometown and permit holders must have their entry fee paid by May 16. All permits must be purchased by May 21 at noon.

In addition to the rodeo there will be western dances, one on Friday evening at 9 p.m. and one on Saturday at 9 p.m. A Indian Arts and Crafts Fair will be held at the grounds throughout the weekend. Persons interested in space at the fair may call (503) 544-3093 for more information. A buckaroo breakfast will be held on Sunday from 6:30 to 10:30 a.m. with a charge of \$4 for adults and \$2.50 for children. Senior Citizen Day will be on Sunday with senior citizens getting into the rodeo for half price. Camper parking will be available on the grounds with a fee of \$2 for the entire weekend.
