Tygh Valley rodeo May 21-20

The Tygh Valley All-Indian annual rodeo will be held May 21 and 22 at the Tywama Saddle Club rodeo grounds at Tygh Valley. It will be the opening show of the year for the members of the Western States Indian Rodeo Association.

This year the queen selection will be open to Indian girls from all tribes. Girls will be chosen for the court on May 20, Friday at 5 p.m. The entrants must be on horseback and in full traditional Indian regalia.

The contest is open to girls who are single and between the ages of 15-18 years. A buckle will be awarded to the girl chosen as the queen.

In addition to the rodeo there will be western dances, one on Friday evening at 9 p.m. and one on Saturday at 9 p.m. A Indian Arts and Crafts Fair will be held at the grounds throughout the weekend. Persons interested in space at the fair may call (503) 544-3093 for more information.

Squiemphen takes first

Sammi Squiemphen, daughter of Earl and Rita Squiemphen, is making a name for herself in the National Collegiate Rodeo Association in team roping. The 24-year-old sophomore at Central Oregon Community College in Bend is a member of the COCC rodeo team. She and her team roping partner, Bret Nordman of Redmond, won the first-place trophy buckles at the Washington State University Collegiate Rodeo held in Pullman on April 29, 30 and May 1.

Sammi and Bret topped a field of 47 teams to bring home the first-place awards. In the long go, the team made a time of 10.7 seconds to qualify for the short go. In the short go, they made a time of 9.6, thus winning the average and the title.

C.R. Squiemphen, age 21, also performed at the Pullman rodeo and won the fourth place monies in barrel racing. In the long go, C.R. made a time of 18.32 to qualify for the short go and in that go, she made a time of 18.48 giving her an average for fourth place.

There are six rodeos left in the National Intercollegiate Rodeo season. The schedule is as follows:

- May 5-7 Eastern Oregon at LaGrande
- May 13-15 Treasure Valley at Ontario, Oregon
- May 22-24 Northwest Regional at Haines, Oregon
- May 28-30 Spokane Community College at Spokane, Washington
- June 3-5 Blue Mountain at Pendleton, Oregon
- June 20-25 College National Finals at Bozeman, Montana.

Memorial trophy to be presented

The Leland E. Tom Memorial Trophy will be presented at the Tygh Valley All-Indian Rodeo on May 21 and 22, 1983. The trophy is to be presented to the All-Around cowboy who wins the most money. The trophy will be a three-year revolving trophy. A cowboy must be the all-around high money winner three years in a row to take the trophy home permanently. To be presented to this year's winner will be a satin jacket with Leland Tom Memorial All-Around Champion, Tygh Valley All-Indian Rodeo, 1983 enscribed in satin stitch.
