Girls' basketball camp offered

Registration forms for Madras Hoop Day Camp 1983 must be in by May 25. The day camp for girls interested in increasing their basketball skills will be held at Madras High School July 18-23.

Hoop Day Camp is organized to provide an inexpensive, quality basketball camp in Central Oregon. It also provides opportunity to develop fundamental skills and knowledge of basketball. Along with the development of these skills the camp is directed at developing a positive self-image and positive mental attitude.

Coach for the camp is Mt. Hood Community College coach Sally Jepson. Assisting her will be four counselors from the MHS varsity team; Ashley Thorpe, Anita Bryant, Jo Raglund and Diane Williams.

Pre-registration forms are due May 25 and can be turned in to coach Bonnie Souers at

MHS. Forms are available at the school, the Warm Springs Community Center and Intertribal Sports.

The camp will be held at MHS gymnasium, July 18-23 at the following times: 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. for girls in grades 3-5 and 1-5:00 p.m. for girls in grades 6-8.

Registration fee is \$30 for grades 3-5 and \$40 for grades 6-8. If more than one person per family registers, there will be a discount of \$5 for the second girl. The full tuition is due no later than May 25, 1983.

Tuition will be refunded without question if enrollment is cancelled prior to July 18. At any time after July 18 refunds will be made for medical reasons only. Requests for refunds must be accompanied by a signed excuse from a doctor. Participants who must be excluded because of injury or illness will receive a prorated refund based on the number of days of participa-

tion. No refunds will be given to participants who voluntarily leave Day Camp or to those excused for disciplinary reasons.

All participants will be covered by a group accident insurance policy. A doctor will be on call daily and hospital facilities are readily available and easily accessible. Because of the rigorous daily schedule each participant should come to camp in good physical condition. Every conceivable effort will be made to protect the participants health and safety through the constant inspection of equipment and supervised instruction of campers. However, participants with pre-existing medical problems will not be accepted unless there is notification prior to registration.

Participants will receive a T-shirt and certificate of completion at conclusion of the camp.

Indian News Notes

Solicitor reverses opinion

The Interior Solicitor, William Coldiron, on April 15 changed an earlier legal opinion that could have deprived Indian tribes of millions of dollars annually for forestry programs. Last May the Solicitor issued an opinion that the Bureau of Indian Affairs should have been depositing administrative fee

deductions from Indian timber sales into the U.S. Treasury, rather than returning them to tribes for forestry expenditures. Interior Secretary James Watt then directed a task force to review the situation and the United States Congress also had a study done.

At the annual Timber Symposium in Missoula,

Montana, the last week in April, Interior Assistant Secretary Ken Smith read a memo from Mr. Coldiron which said, in part: "At the request of the Secretary we have again reviewed the ambiguous provisions of this amendment along with its ambiguous legislative history. Congress has knowingly and intentionally acquiesced in current Bureau practices. Accordingly, we are now inclined... to find that the Secretary has the authority to reduce the amount of administrative fees deposited into the Treasury to the extent tribes expend such funds on forestry management."
