

Proposed Range Plan meetings planned

Three separate district meetings have been scheduled to discuss the upcoming agriculture and range management plan. The meetings will deal with specific questions concerning grazing authorizations, distribution of range improvement funds, organization of grazing groups and whose responsibility it is for various enforcement actions. Also to be discussed are the results of the questionnaires that were sent to all the tribal livestock owners on the reservation.

The plans' objectives are to bring the reservation range resources up to their full capacity and to increase the opportunities for tribal members to receive a greater income from their livestock and farming operations. It is

most important that the plan meet the needs and desires of all tribal livestock owners as completely as possible and be consistent with tribal policies and BIA trust responsibilities.

People farming and ranching on different parts of the reservation have different ideas and needs. It is important that the committee receives input on how the range program should be operated. The committee working on the plan will develop alternatives that will be presented this fall.

Also to be discussed at the meeting will be jobs bill money that has been allocated to Warm Springs. Approximately \$185,000 of the total \$405,000 that has been allocated to Warm Springs will be used for range and agriculture projects.

Springs and Mable and Bill Eyle of Warm Springs. Donetta will be in the community selling tickets for the rodeo. She is looking forward to representing the Warm Springs community as a member of the court.

Thirteen-year-old **Alfredine Smith**, daughter of Sylvester and Pat Smith of Warm Springs is looking forward to being a representative at the Treaty Days Rodeo. The eighth grader attends Madras Junior High where she has been active in volleyball, basketball, softball and the Culture Club. 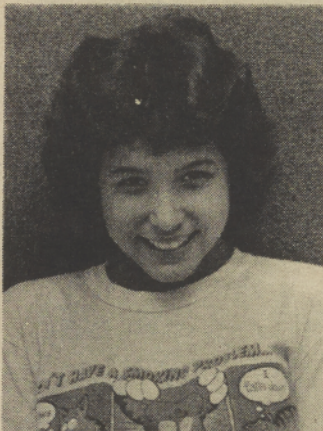

Plan to attend the two day rodeo, support the candidate of your choice and buy your tickets early. Tickets will be sold by the girls through Friday, June 24.



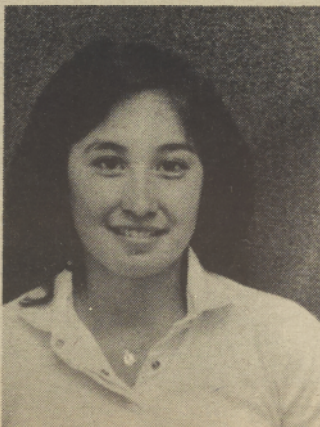

Utilities stresses new credit policy

A new credit policy went into effect in July 1982 that many people are unaware of. Once again, for your information the following is now in effect.

Any person wishing to have work done is required to fill out a credit application with the accounting department. After this has been done, they will notify us and let us know if you are eligible for credit. Ask to

Dressing ceremonies were held at the Madras Evergreen Chapel on May 22 with Felix Wallulatum officiating. Overnight tribal ceremonies followed at the Simnasho Longhouse with Matilda Mitchell, Herbert Stwyer, Sr. and Wilson Wewa officiating. Burial was at the Simnasho Cemetery on May 23.
