Use caution in lightning storms

According to the National Center for Health Statistics, lightning kills about 150 Americans each year and injures another 250. Property loss is put at \$150 million annually.

It is also estimated that 1,800 thunderstorms are in progress over the earth's surface at any given moment and that lightning strikes the earth 100 times each second.

The following is a list of rules designed to save lives when lightning threatens. The

list was compiled by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration of the U.S. Department of Commerce.

—Stay indoors; don't venture outside unless absolutely necessary.

—Stay away from open doors and windows, fireplaces, radiators, stoves, metal pipes, sinks and plug-in electrical appliances.

—Don't use electrical equipment such as hair dryers,

electric toothbrushes and electric razors during the storm.

—Don't use the telephone. Lightning may strike the telephone lines outside.

—Don't work on fences, telephone or power lines, pipelines or structural steel fabrication.

—Don't use metal objects such as fishing rods and golf clubs. Golfers wearing cleated shoes are particularly good lightning rods.

—Don't handle flammable materials in open containers.

—Stop tractor work, especially when the tractor is pulling metal equipment, and dismount. Tractors and other implements in metallic contact with the ground often are struck by lightning.

—Get out of the water and off small boats.

—Stay in your automobile if you are traveling. Automobiles offer excellent lightning protection.

—Seek shelter in buildings. If no buildings are available, your best protection is a cave, ditch, canyon or head-high clumps of trees in open forest land.

—When there is no shelter, avoid the highest object in the area. If only isolated trees are nearby, your best protection is to crouch in the open, keeping twice as far away from isolated trees as the trees are high.

—When you feel an electrical charge—if your hair stands on end or your skin tingles—lightning may be about to strike you. Drop to the ground immediately.

Ernest Tom

Lifelong resident of Warm Springs, Ernest Tom died at Mountain View Hospital in Madras on July 3. He was born in Warm Springs to Elmer and Mary Hote Tom on June 6, 1938. He was an enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs.

Tom had worked as a timber faller but retired due to poor health. At the time of his death he was a self-employed rancher. He attended school in Warm Springs. He had been a member of the Rodeo Cowboys Association now known as the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association. He participated in team roping. His mother preceded him in

death. He is survived by his father Elmer Tom, Sr.; three children, Amanda, Corbette and Merlin Tom of Warm Springs; two brothers, Eldon and Lee Tom of Warm Springs and five sisters, Barbara Sam of White Swan, Washington, Sally Tom of Cascade Locks; Cordelia Kneeland, Rosie Tom and Janet Billey of Warm Springs.

Dressing ceremonies were held at Madras Evergreen Chapel Wednesday, July 6 at 3 p.m. Tribal overnight ceremonies followed at the Warm Springs Agency Longhouse with burial at the Dry Creek Cemetery on Thursday, July 7 at 6 a.m.
