Barbeque safety stressed

Barbeques/portable grills, a popular backyard item during the summer months, poses a danger as they tip over causing people to be burned who are standing too close. Children sometimes are tempted to poke at the fire, unaware of the danger. Parents should never leave grills unattended.

When using liquid charcoal lighter to start a fire, never pour or squirt the fluid on an already-lighted fire. The flames may travel up the stream of fluid and cause the container to explode in your hands.

When lighting your charcoal, keep all flammable liquids away from the grill.

Keep all children away from the grill, it could be pulled over easily onto a child.

Never use anything else but charcoal lighter fluid to ignite your charcoal.

Safely dispose of used, hot charcoals; do not place near combustibles.

Fire precautions, laws offered

Fire danger is high and with the late spring rain, the grasses are in their over abundant stages.

This year the Warm Springs reservation has experienced several fires caused by children. Had the wind and temperature been that of normal June weather, these fires could have destroyed more acreage, homes and even human life.

We urge parents to keep close watch on their children and to teach their children the dangers of playing with fire. You, as parents, are responsible for your children's actions. You could possibly be

billed for suppression cost under federal regulation 141.22 which states:

(1) "Willful and unauthorized setting fire to timber, underbrush, or grass or other inflammable material upon any Indian reservation or lands belonging to or occupied by any tribe or group of Indians under authority of the United States, or upon any Indian allotment while the title to the same shall be held in trust by the Government, or while the same shall remain inalienable by the allottee without the consent of the United States, is punishable by fine of not more

than \$5,000 or imprisonment of not more than five years, or both."

(2) "Whoever, having kindled or caused to be kindled, a fire in or near any forest timber, or other inflammable material on such lands, leaves said fire without totally extinguishing it, or permits such fire to spread beyond his control or leaves such fire unattended shall be fined not more than \$500 or imprisonment not more than six months, or both."

Head Start program enrollment criteria

The Head Start enrollment papers for the 1983-84 school year are now available in the Head Start office in the Community Center. Proof of income will be required in the form of either a pay stub, a W-2 form from last year, income tax forms 1040 or 1040A, or a note from your employer. Unemployment and Social Security count as income also—bring in a stub from one of your checks. We will make a Xerox copy of your proof of income and return it to you and it will be kept confidential.

Physical examinations are required for all children new to

Head Start. If your child was in Head Start last year, you will not need to have a physical done again (immunizations must be up dated, however). If the immunization record for your child must be sent away for, please start early since we cannot enroll children whose records are not complete. Physical and immunization forms may be picked up at any time in the Head Start office.

Parents who wish to have their children enrolled in Head Start this fall are encouraged to come in and register as soon as possible. The first day of Head Start will be Monday, September 12.
